This is a particularly disturbing because of what something like this can do the game of hockey.

If children are paid to score goals, then chances are that their passing of the puck will lessen in frequency.

That also means team-play will deteriorate and everyone on the ice will be trying to break through the other team's defence singlehandedly and thus get nowhere.

Hockey is a team sport. It was designed to be just that.

This pay as you score ploy just destroys all good intentions of the game. It's a team win and a team loss.

If parents pay their children for all the goals they score, it almost means the children are competing on a professional level and minor hockey was meant as a place for recreation.

One former hockey coach I've spoken to commented, they had this problem when they were involved in Midland minor hockey.

Their solution was simple. They paid the players one dollar out of their own pocket for every assist.

This stopped the problem in it's tracks and hockey became team sport again for that

team. This is, of course, a costly way to go about reinstating the team aspect to minor hockey but it worked.

Coaches shouldn't be put into this position where they have to work twice as hard to undo the damage done by parents who wish nothing more than to see their child excel, even if it means abandoning the actual concept of the game.

Young hockey players are difficult enough to work with as coaches strive to develop good hockey habits in the players without the parents' intervention.

Some parents have even been known to pay their children if they played a good, rough hockey game.

This may not promote puck-hogging but it does prompt rough play.

One thing hockey doesn't need is rough play. The Philadelphia Flyers found this out several years ago.

Sure, they won the Stanley Cup playing that way but they've certainly changed their ways since then and they still continue winning.

Coaches again suffer from this intrusion into the instruction of good hockey by the parents as they have to watch as the players sit in the penalty box several times in a game.

This hurts the team as well and means that the team must play with less players than the other team.

Perhaps, there should be a running account for players like this with them getting paid by the parents for their goals but the players paying one dollar for every time they get a penalty.

Parents think minor hockey teams should be run professionally, therefore the players should accept responsibilities as well as
