Although they do not put in as many hours as the competitive gymnasts they work just as hard. For most of these girls, the precompetitive section is a stepping stone to more advanced gymnastics. It is at this level that the gymnast develops good working habits and proper technique for future progress.

This section is not restricted to the future stars. Many girls do not want to compete seriously in gymnastics. This section is also for them. It gives these gymnasts a chance to enjoy the sport in a non-threatening manner.

Not only is it a good way to improve their fitness level, but also, many parents see the pre-competitive section of the club as an excellent means of developing their child's self-confidence, posture and skill, just to mention a few.

The pre-competitives are divided into three

age categories. These are the Argos, under 12, Tyros, under 14, and Juniors over 14 years of age. The majority of our gymnasts are in the Argo division. Under the present organization of the club, we have a ratio of 6-7 gymnasts per instructor. We are extremely pleased with this arrangement.

Space does not permit me to go over each member of the pre-competitive club but it would be safe to say that every school and community in a radius of 15 miles is represented in our club. It is a pleasure to see so many people getting involved.
