Family allowance cheques to go up in '81: Ottawa

For families living in Huronia as well as elsewhere throughout the nation, Ottawa has some good news for you.

Health and Welfare Minister Monique Begin announced this week, there will be a full escalation of Family Allowances this year.

The Family Act Allowances provides for annual escalation of payments in January of each year in accordance with the increase in the cost of living.

Effective in January, the federal government

Family Allowances paid monthly for children under 18 will rise to \$23.96 from \$21.80 in most provinces and in the territories. In addition, the refundable Child Tax Credit will provide up to \$238.00 per child per year based on. family income.

The amount and method of payment of Allowances Family varies in Quebec and Under a Alberta. in the provision Family Allowances Act, a provincial government may ask the federal government to

vary the rates payable in that province according to the age or number of children in a family, or both, providing the payments average \$23.96. Quebec and Alberta have again chosen this option.

Special Allowances, which are paid to foster parents, welfare agencies, government departments and institutions maintaining children, will increase to \$33.53 from \$30.51.

Each month during 1980 the federal government paid out more than \$151 million

in Family Allowances to 3.6 million families. The cheques covered 6.9 million children. The national average allowance for each recipient family was about \$42 monthly.




