Yet the township actually stretches east well past Coldwater.

The township over the past 22 years has built or has had built for it 10 bridges. Most of the spans are now crossing the Hog River. But some are situated over railway right-of-ways.

Since late last year an 11th bridge has been under construction, this one over the North River just a few miles north of Coldwater.

Cost of the project is \$260,000 of which 80 percent will be funded through Ministry of Transportation and Communications subsidies.

We are constantly amazed as we travel through North Simcoe communities (townships included) at how well municipalities and provincial government agencies work so well together in discerning needs and then where and when possible collaborating on their funding.

Mind you that's not new in Penetanguishene where the municipal staff has this art down to a science.

As the cruiser pulled to a stop in front of the snowmobile, it went up the snowbank on the road's edge but fell back, damaging with the impact the cruiser's right front fender.
