Students study a new history

Students and teachers at Elmvale District High School rocked on to the sounds of such music greats as Elton John, the Beatles, Led Zepplin and Bill Haley last week when Paul

The students gathered for the assembly last Friday afternoon, to hear the comments of the D.J. and view a 30-minute film presentation on the origins of rock music.

As the film dealt with musicians like Billy Joel, Bruce Springsteen, Gary Newman and more, young people were encouraged to show their likes or dislikes as each appeared.

What resulted was high volume music, some vigorous applause and the occasional outburst of boos.

Educational value According to Mr. Ted Roberts, principal at EDHS, the presentation had educational value in that it taught students their cultural background by showing how modern music was formed from a classical music background.

Beethoven's influence on E.L.O. was shown, Supertramp's ability to adapt and survive in the

changing music scene, Springsteen's influence by Elvis Presley and the persistence of Styx in staying in the musical limelight, were all touched on.

In the poll conducted during the screening of the "History of Rock" clear winners in student applause were Styx, Billy Joel and Springsteen, while Mick Jaeger and his Rolling Stones did not impress at all.

A question and answer period followed the presentation and ones such as "Is Jim Morrison dead?" and "Why are radio stations in Toronto more interesting to listen to?" were tossed at Dipietro.

Arrangements Arrangements for the hour-long presentation were made completely by Mark Graham, a member of the Assembly Committee at the school.

Mark said he heard over CHUM that presentations of this type could be held in the schools, within CHUM's listening range and arranged last November to have the film shown here.

There was no cost to the school or students, and according to Mark, it was a good way to arrange an assembly the students would enjoy.

By the looks of the toe-tapping going on in the

rear of the auditorium, the teachers had just as much fun as the young people.

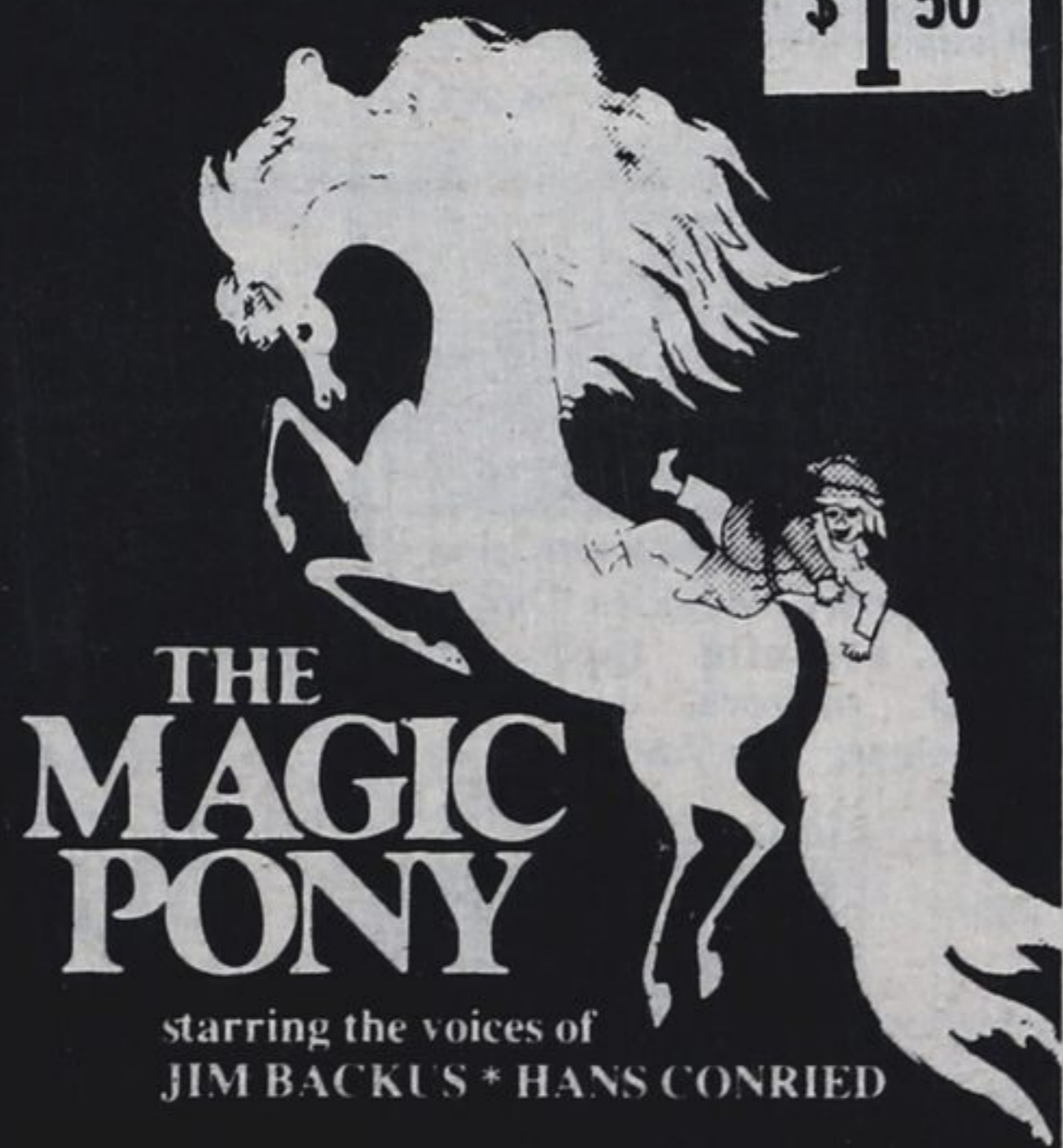
