\$12 million boost for area tourism

Ontario Industry and **Tourism Minister Larry** Grossman announced \$12 million in financial assistance for the Craigleitch / Blue Mountain resort area.

The money will go towards development of sanitary sewage and waterworks systems required to spur recreational development in the locality.

"This assistance will attract those developers who have long expressed a keen interest in investing in the area." Grossman said.

"We estimate that \$150 million in private investment will result and that some 240 jobs will be created during the construction phase alone."

Of the grants, \$8 million will come from existing programs of the Ministry of the Environment and the remaining \$4 million from a new Board of

Industrial Leadership and Development (BII.D) program which provides special servicing funds to assist rural communities in attracting growth industries.

Design work is expected to start this year. Water should be available in 1983 and the sewage system operative by 1985.

ensure that Collingwood becomes what it has always had the potential to become - one of the foremost tourist attractions in Eastern Canada," Grossman said.

At present, Blue Mountain attracts more than 500,000 skiers a year. With proper servicing leading to further development, this figure is expected to
