Two key people leave RC system

Bernard J. Corbiere, superintendent of business and finance of the Simcoe County Roman Catholic Separate School Board since the board's inception in 1969 is to retire Sept. 30.

Corbiere actually

joined the Catholic School Board system two years before the actual board was formed.

Appreciation was expressed to Corbiere for his service to the board these past 14 years.

The board was also told of Principal Daniel Blake's decision to retire June 30 as head of St. Charles School in Bradford.

Blake's career spans more than 40 years in the field of education.

Budget in final formative stage: clerk

The 1981 budget for the Town of Penetanguishene could be ready for release in early May, according to the town clerk.

Last year's budget was nearly \$2.7 million, up \$300,000 from the previous year, an increase of about 10 per cent.

Clerk Yvon Gagne suggested that an increase of the same proportion this year, taking into account the rate of inflation, would

not be surprising.

At the beginning of the year the finance and administration committee of the town approved broad guidelines for each committee of the town council. Each committee sets its own budget and then turns

its proposed budget to the finance committee for approval.

The clerk expects that the various committees of council will have submitted their budgets for 1981 to the finance committee within the next two weeks.

Interview list will be made tomorrow

Members of the Penetanguishene public safety committee will

meet tomorrow with Stan Raika, a member of the Ontario Police Commission, to choose those applicants for the position of chief of police that the committee will interview before making its choice.

Mayor Ron Bellisle said yesterday that Raika was a member of the Ontario Police Commission team that conducted an adequacy survey of the town police force.

The applications have been forwarded to Raika as they have arrived at the town office, the mayor said.

The Ontario Police Commission is better able to make judgments as to who to invite and who not to invite for an interview than is the town, the mayor said, because of its extensive knowledge of police departments across the province.

The interviews will likely begin next week, depending on the availability of applicants to appear before the public safety committee.

Sunday morning busiest time

Early Sunday morning was the eventful portion of an otherwise quiet Easter weekend for town police.

Shortly after 1 a.m. Sunday police charged Rick Story, 19, of 174 Charles St., Midland, and Kenneth Dumont, 21, of 72 Main St., Penetanguishene, with causing a disturbance by fighting.

Police received a report that two persons were fighting in the vicinity of the Commodore Hotel.

A couple of hours later Glen Bogie Crescent, Midland resident Robert Howell, 25, was charged on the Main Street with possession of a narcotic and obstructing a police officer.

Some time between 5 and 6 p.m. last Thursday \$450 worth of mechanics tools

belonging to Gilbert Deschambault of 208 Church Street were

taken from a pickup truck parked at the town dock.

Last Friday between noon and 12.45 p.m. stereo speakers valued

at \$80 and belonging to RR 1 Victoria Harbour resident Paul Stubbing

were taken from a car parked in front of 32 Peel Street.

Three responses to ad for constable

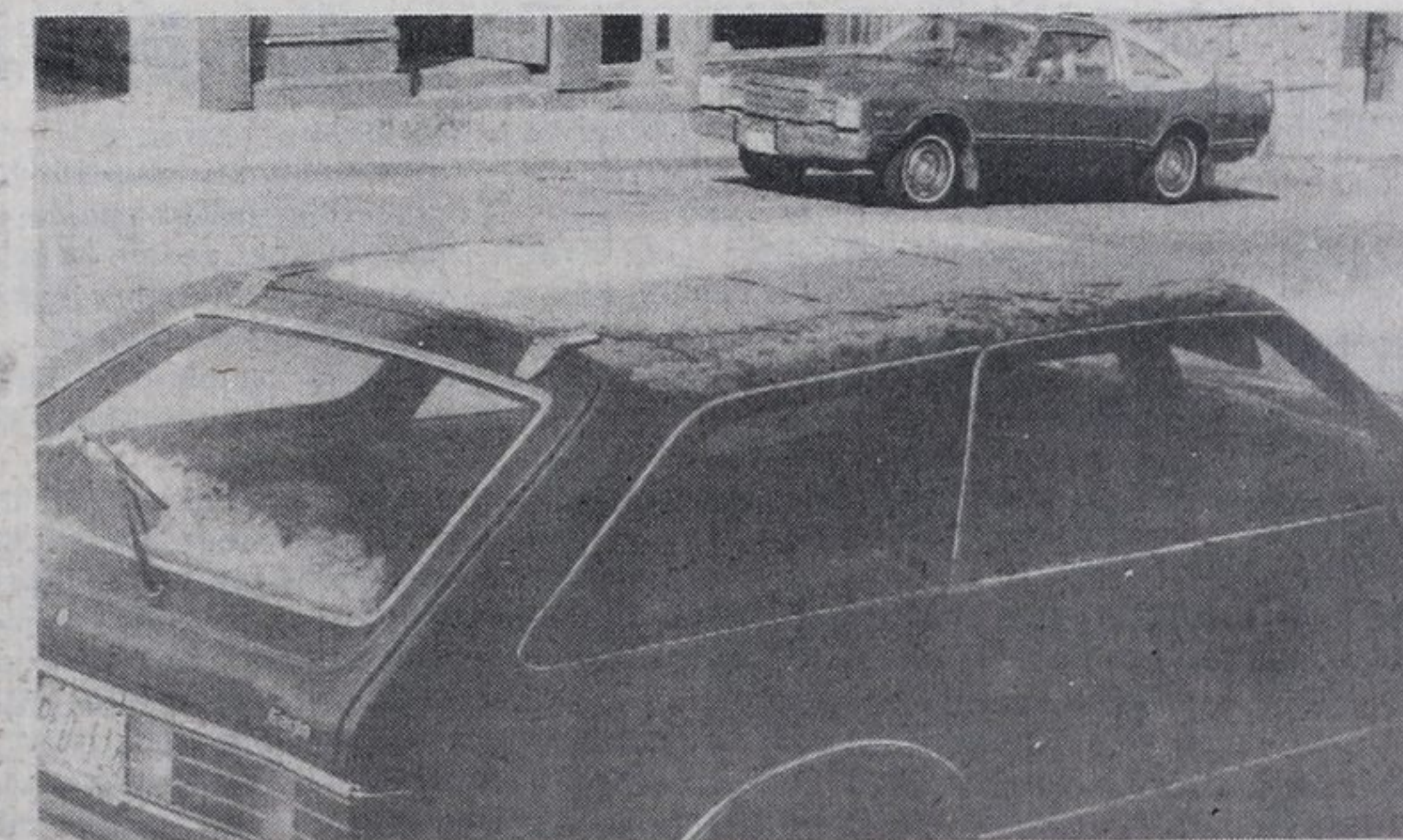
As of yesterday Penetanguishene had received three applications to fill the vacancy on the town police force created by the abrupt resignation recently of Bernard Maracle, who had been with the local police force for 15 or 16 years.

The deadline for applications for the position of constable is this Friday.

The town police force since Maracle's resignation has been short two men from its normal number. Tomorrow members of the town public safety committee will select from 33 applicants for the position of chief of police those applicants that it wishes to interview. The interviews will quite likely start next week.
