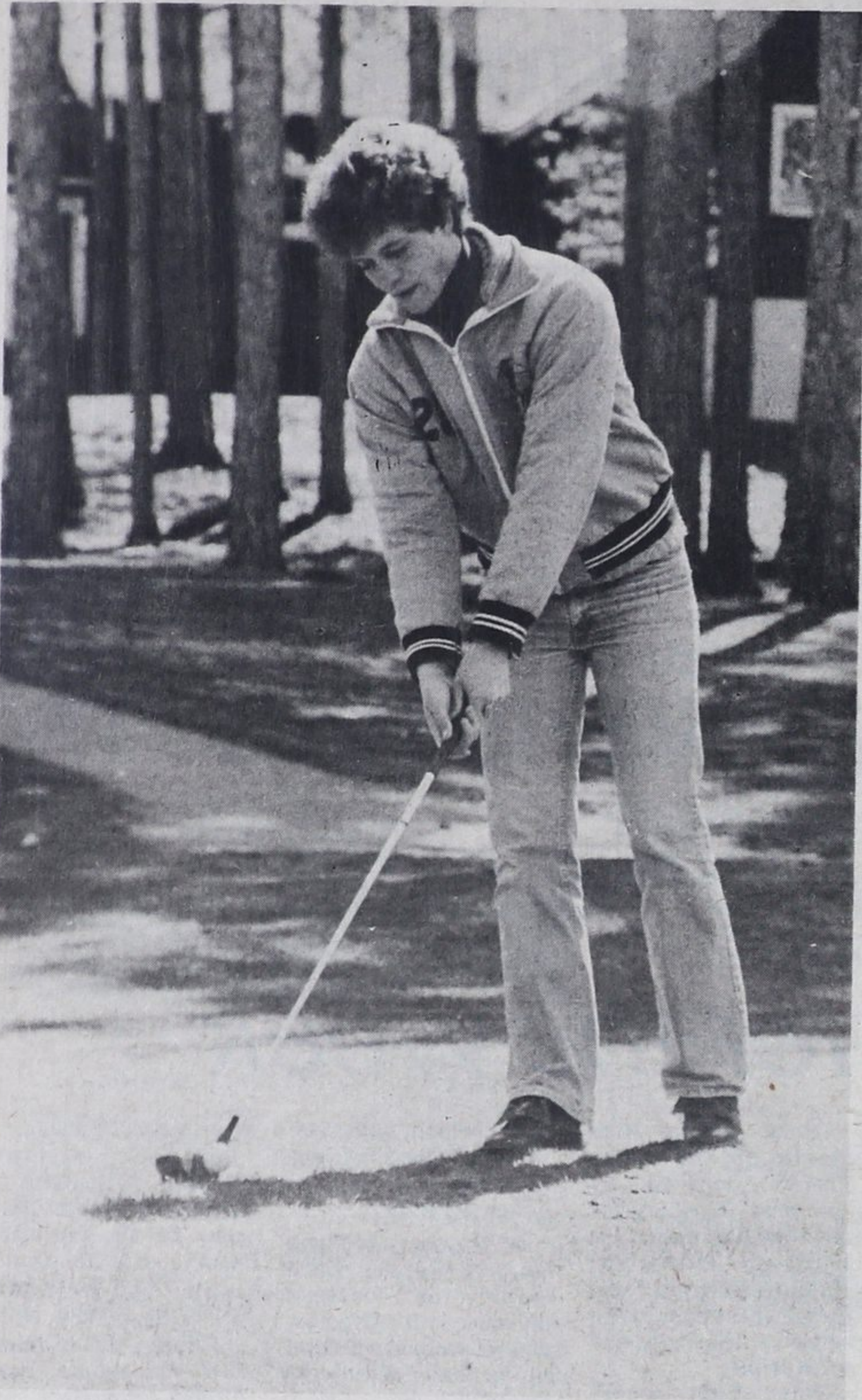

NOTICE TO THE RESIDENTS OF THE CORPORATION OF THE TOWNSHIP OF TINY, COUNTY OF SIMCOE

ONTARIO REGULATION 190/81

Take Notice that on March 27, 1981, the Minister of Housing, pursuant to section 32(1) of The Planning Act, made a zoning order covering the northeast quarter of lot 105, the east half of lot 106, the east half 107, and the southeast quarter of lot 108, Concession 1, O.S. Township of Tiny, County of Simcoe.

The order reads as follows:

ORDER MADE UNDER THE PLANNING ACT

RESTRICTED AREAS - TOWNSHIP OF TINY IN THE COUNTY OF SIMCOE

- In this Order,
 - "accessory," when used to describe a use, building or structure, means a use, building or structure normally incidental or subordinate to the principal use, building or structure located on the same lot;
 - "commercial use" means a use of land, buildings or structures for the purposes of buying and selling commodities or supplying services;
 - "floor area" means the total area of all floors contained within the outside walls of a building or structure;
 - "lot" means a parcel of land,
 - described in a deed or other document legally capable of conveying land, or
 - shown as a lot or block on a registered plan of subdivision.
- This Order applies to the following lands in the Township of Tiny in the County of Simcoe:
 - The northeast quarter of Lot 105, Concession 1, O.S.
 - The east half of Lot 106, Concession 1, O.S.
 - The east half of Lot 107 in Concession 1, O.S.
 - The southeast quarter of Lot 108 in Concession 1, O.S.
- Nothing in this Order prevents the use of any land, building or structure for a purpose prohibited by this Order if such land, building or structure was lawfully used for such purpose on the day this Order comes into force, or prevents the erection or use of any building or structure the plans for which were approved by the municipal architect or building inspector of the Township of Tiny prior to the day this Order comes into force if the erection of such building or structure is commenced within two years after the day this Order comes into force and such building or structure is completed within a reasonable time after the erection thereof is commenced.
- (1) Subject to subsection (2), no building or structure containing a floor area exceeding 465 square metres shall be erected or used for commercial uses.

(2) Notwithstanding subsection (1), a building or structure used for commercial uses and lawfully existing on the day this Order comes into force may be extended or enlarged provided such extension or enlargement does not exceed a maximum floor area of 279 square metres.

- (1) No building or structure used for commercial uses shall be located within eight metres of any lot line.
- Not more than one building or structure used for commercial uses may be erected on a lot but this subsection does not prohibit the erection of accessory buildings or structures where there is compliance with all other provisions of this Order.
- (1) Nothing in this Order prevents the repair or reconstruction of any building or structure that is damaged or destroyed by causes beyond the control of the owner.
- (2) Nothing in this Order prevents the strengthening or restoration to a safe condition of any building or structure or part of any building or structure.

Any new construction or use of land in contravention of the order may result in a fine of up to \$1,000.00. An injunction to terminate use or construction or to demolish the structure may also be issued.

Your attention is directed to the following subsections of section 32 of The Planning Act:

- The Minister may, on his own initiative or at the request of any person, by order amend or revoke in whole or in part any order made under section 1.
- Except as provided in subsection 9, the Minister before amending or revoking in whole or in part an order made under subsection 1 shall give notice or cause to be given notice thereof in such manner as he considers proper and shall allow such period of time as he considers appropriate for the submission of representations in respect thereof.
- Where an application is made to the Minister to amend or revoke in whole or in part any order made under subsection 1, the Minister may, and on the request of any person shall, request the Municipal Board to hold a hearing on the application and thereupon the Municipal Board shall hold a hearing as to whether the order should be amended or revoked in whole or in part.
