Name change needed to help tourists report says

Midland and Tiny Township will be asked to support Penetanguishene's request to the Minister of Transportation and Communications to have Highway 27 between Waverley and Penetanguishene renamed, to make travel to Penetanguishene easier for tourists.

Last summer, while improving that stretch of road, the ministry built an intersection at Waverley. Tourists driving Highway 400 and Highway 93 to Penetanguishene since the change have to stop in Waverley and turn onto Highway 27. The change to Highway 93 of the stretch of Highway 27 between Waverley and Penetanguishene would make the giving of directions easier, the town's public works committee thinks.

Midland and Tiny Township are involved because Highway 27 runs through, or along, each municipality.

Co-operation continues to exist

Town of Midland has taken yet another step in an effort to reduce phosphorus and heavy metal(s) loading at its water pollution treatment plant.

Last year the town commissioned an industrial waste study which was undertaken by CBCL Limited.

That study has since been unveiled.

The document pinpoints those local industries discharging industrial waste water into the town's sewer system that should be reduced so that each industry of concern will in future be allowed to discharge only 10,000 pounds of phosphorus and three from five parts per million heavy metals such as nickel.

Yesterday morning most of those key industries sent representatives to town hall to discuss the industrial waste study with Commissioner of Works Percy Ehler, water pollution plant

chief operator Jim Murray and with an official from the Ministry of the Environment.

Ehler called the meeting an important forum where those wishing to comment on the report or make observations were welcome to do so.

Ehler noted in preparing the original document that a lot of co-operation had been received by the various

Midland industries surveyed and that that kind of co-operation existed at yesterday's meeting.

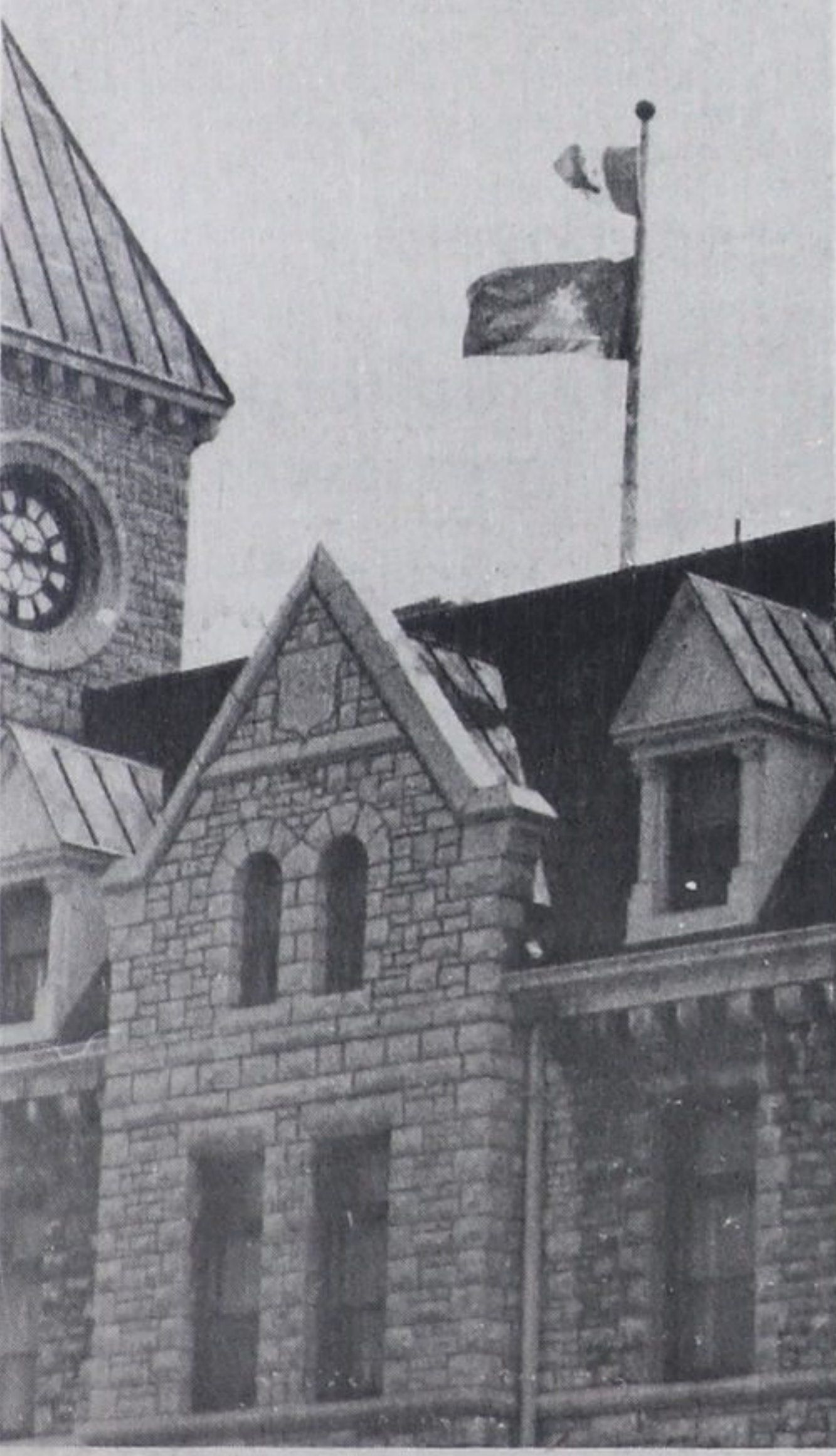
There were no objections registered to the report. Meanwhile the water pollution treatment plant which is undergoing a multi-million-dollar expansion program should be totally expanded within the next few months as construction at the plant nears completion.

Wages

Penetanguishene is supporting Aylmer Ontario's objection to the recent wage settlements of the Ontario Provincial Police and of provincial employees.

Aylmer's objections are that the settlements were secretly arrived at before the recent provincial election, and that the settlements themselves were above guidelines for all municipal, civic and government employees.

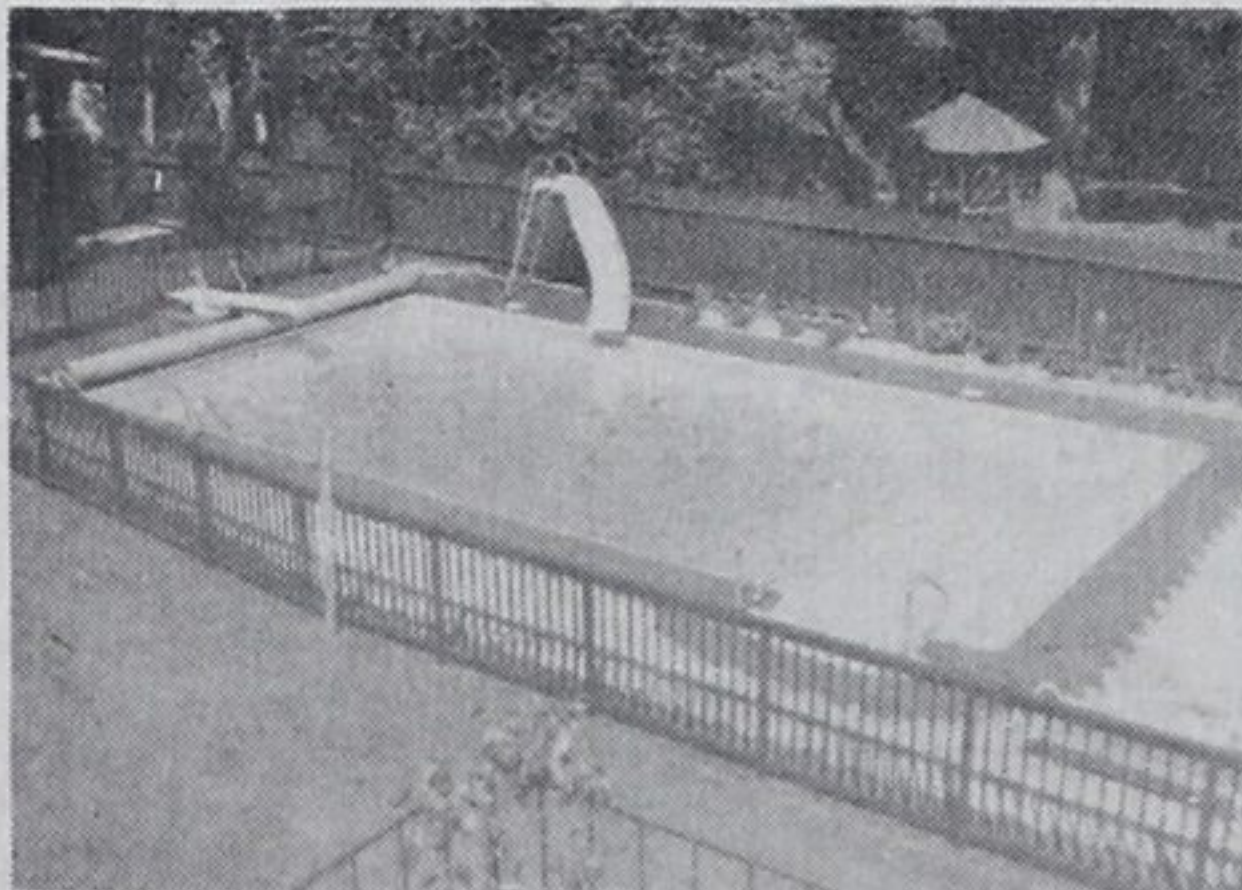
The provincial government is also being asked to give smaller municipalities higher per capita grants so that the smaller municipalities will be able "to survive a wage administration cost which is substantially above the ability of the taxpayer to handle on a local basis."
