The girls arrived at the Science Centre around noon. After lunching in a cafeteria there, they spent almost four hours looking at or taking part in the many


different exhibits in the building.

The girls were well behaved throughout both tours. The bus trip there and back was considerably louder and we must give thanks to our very patient bus driver for putting up with us.


Port McNicoll Recreation Board is putting on its first adult dance this year. It will take place at the Legion on Saturday June 20, beginning at 9 p.m.
