It's that time of year. Bass season is just around the corner and to hawg hunters that only means one thing.

The Little Lake Bass Derby will soon be underway. It's down on the books as the 19th Annual Little Lake Bass Derby.

Lures will be touching water in the oldest derby in Canada at 6 a.m. on June 28.

The last line to be reeled up will have to be on shore before 6p.m.

For those who finish second and third there are cash awards. I have reserved first place cash for myself this year, but if by chance someone else takes top honours it too will be a cash award plus the number one trophy, which makes the winner top angler for 1981.

Weigh-in times will be the same as in past years, 12 noon, 3 p.m. and final chance at 6 p.m.

Only one prize will be allowed per entry. I'm sure the only reason this regulation was put in was to stop myself from picking up enough money to fly to Las Vegas.

No minnows are allowed during the Bass Derby. This is not only a regulation of the derby but also a bylaw on the books of town hall.

Restricting use of minnows keeps unwanted species from entering Little Lake. It seems we have a hard enough time just keeping those big hawgs alive in this small lake.

It's too bad, but there will be no weight bonus for live release. Most contestants do release their catch but a bonus may give a few more the incentive to release since most anglers do not eat their catch anyway.

Regardless of the bonus, if you're not going to eat it do everything in your power to keep bass alive. The lake needs all the care we can give it.

There are only a few contestants I'm watching. I understand Mr. Clean, Paul Quenelle, is talking about a comeback in our derby. Jean Power is always dangerous in a clinch. I understand Jean gets her husband John Power to talk in his sleep, giving away some faithfully guarded bass secrets.

· Of course, John, the only other contestant to win the derby more than once, is always dangerous.

It seems Dan Lecroix has cornered the market on frogs. It's for sure he'll have to be watched. Lecroix's boat has been named "Frog Power". All I can say after winning this number one derby five times is "its lonely at the top".
