Tools stolen from Port man

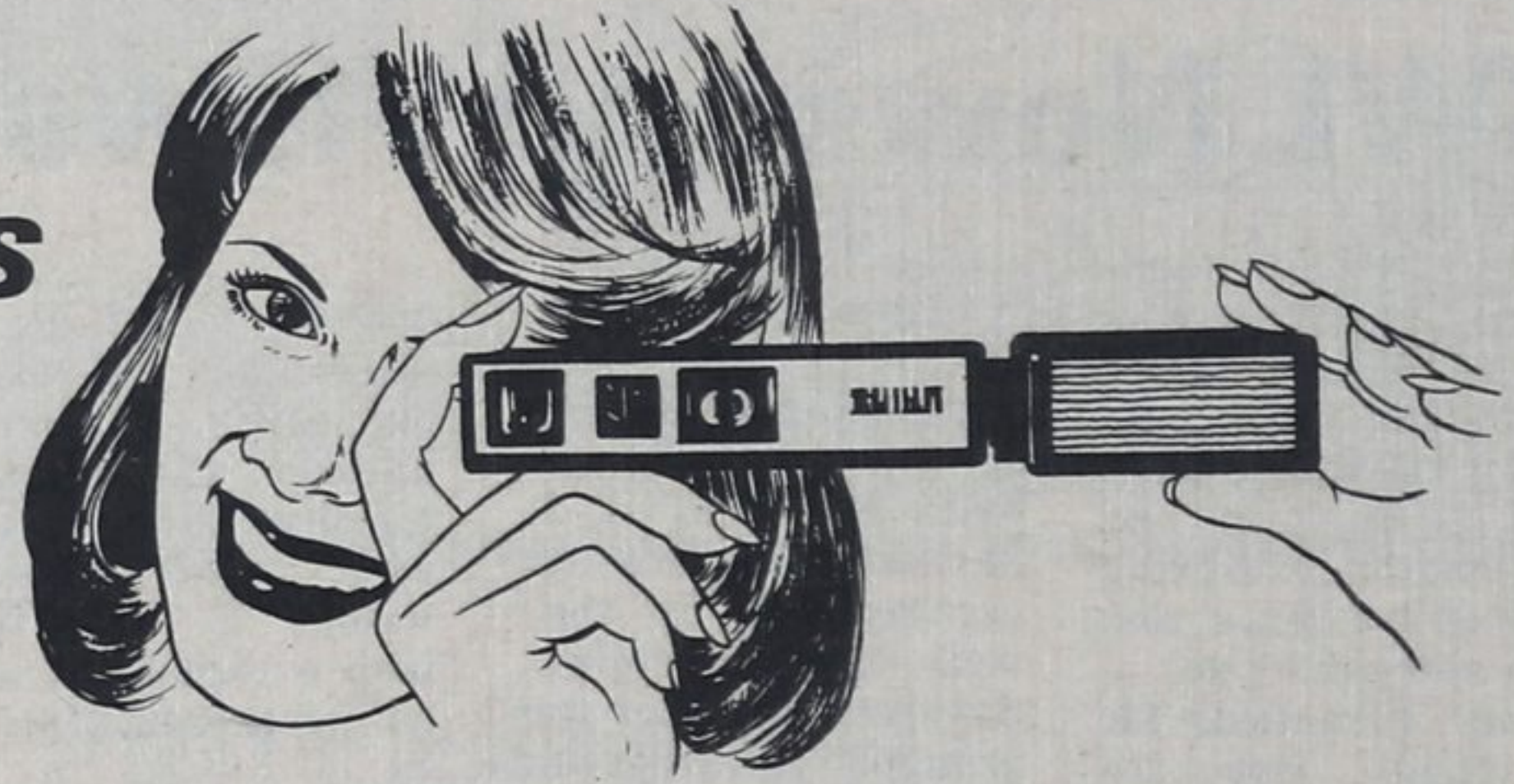
The Midland OPP is investigating the theft of \$1,000 worth of tools belonging to a Port McNicoll man, which were taken between June 16 and 17.
