First stage of drug and alcohol education program ready for fall

The general program committee of the Simcoe County Board of Education was recently advised that a staff committee composed of two superintendents, two principals and two vice-principals had undertaken to conduct during the winter a survey of school and staff needs in relation to drug and alcohol education.

Surveys were sent to each elementary school for a staff response and to each secondary school for separate responses from school administration, guidance personnel, students' council and physical and health educators.

In considering the responses and suggestions from schools, the staff committee agreed that a reasonable first stage for program development would include the following:

The development of a core instructional program for all students in Grade 7, 8, 9 and 10. This would be directly related to the Ministry of Education guideline for physical and health education:

The development of a centralized information service to provide schools with regular and current data from various agencies and from field research. The

collection of appropriate materials will be expanded at the audio-visual center and the curriculum resource center and a catalogue provided to schools. A resource kit will be developed to assist schools with program activities:

Assistance will be provided for in-service activities for staff.

With the appointment of a program advisor for September, 1981, and the provision of funds within the curriculum budget, these recommendations from the staff committee will be considered late in the fall, the board was told.

Strikes out seeking auction items

Councillor Robert Klug made a good try on Monday at getting some items for the Chamber of Commerce to auction during its three-hour auction on July 1.

When Deputy-reeve Frances St. Amant told council the police department wants to have a sale of its accumulated stolen and abandoned property, Klug, who is a council representative on the chamber of commerce board, suggested the property could be offered with a reserve price at the auction, the chamber to keep any money taken in above

the reserve price. Unfortunately for the chamber, regulations are such that the department has to dispose of stolen and abandoned property itself.

Among the items of stolen property that will be up for sale are over 20 bicycles, St. Amant said. No date was given for an auction.

The new police department building is not furnished with a refrigerator, she said. She explained that enough money might be raised at an auction to buy a refrigerator for the police department.

During the same meeting, Klug and St. Amant were at odds over the chamber of commerce's practice of donating a trophy and money to Ecole Secondaire Penetanguishene Secondary School, and now also to Ecole Secondaire Le Caron.

St. Amant told Klug that the chamber should not be doing this because the chamber is given money from the town, and it is duplication for both to give grants. Councillor Lionel Dion said he believes the

chamber is only empowered to promote free enterprise, and that it has no jurisdiction to give grants.

Councillor Klug defended the chamber's practice, saying that it acts on behalf of both business and industry, and that by giving grants it was supporting the educational "seed of the future."

The chamber's charter should be

checked and relevant sections should be brought to the chamber's attention, if necessary, Mayor Ron Bellisle said.

During its May 26 meeting the chamber agreed to continue giving a \$75 donation and trophy to ESPSS, and to start doing the same for Le Caron, with the provision that not more than \$75 be given to Le Caron.
