

Mother entered winner of contest

Miss Bikini of the Dock Lunch-CKMP Bikini Contest held Sunday afternoon at the Penetanguishene town dock is 18-year-old graduate of Midland Secondary School, Corrine Schmidt.

The tall blonde with French braids down her back and a \$100 Indian style bikini was one of 19 contestants, all but one female. The single male contestant, identified as Miss Snarly, wore a bikini, as required to qualify.

Schmidt said that she was in the contest because her mother entered her. Asked if she thought she was going to win, she answered she thought it less likely as the contest went on.

The first runner-up was Cheryl Russell from Base Borden. The second runner-up was a Mississauga resident, Ingrid Stangl.

Some 2,500 onlookers covered the town dock parking lot under a slightly overcast sky, encircling the stage erected in the centre of the pavement

for the second annual civic holiday contest. Another 500 cars had to be turned away.

Last year's winner, Darlene Menard from Lafontaine, was on hand to help Dock Lunch owner and contest organizer Nick Boudouris give Schmidt a bouquet of roses and a trophy. Schmidt also won a trip for two to Nassau.

During the preliminary judging, four parachutists drifted down from the sky and landed on the outskirts of the crowd. A belly dancing demonstration preceded the appearance of the bikini contestants on the elevated, makeshift stage.

Any of the spectators who were hoping to see Miss Nude World, Peggy McIntaggart, were disappointed. The Penetanguishene girl who won the title in Winona, Ont., recently was on Sunday on her way to Japan by way of Toronto. Trips to Japan, Jamaica and New York were prizes she won in the Miss Nude World contest.
