review Movie

Donald Sutherland gives one of the greatest performances of his career in a new suspense thriller called The Eye Of The Needle.

The 45-year-old Canadian born actor first came to prominence in 1970 in Mash, but throughout that decade he remained one of my least favourite actors, mainly because I was put off to a large extent by the kooky slightly oddball characters he seemed to specialize in playing.

Several years ago I sat up and took notice when he played the hero of the remake of Invasion Of The Body Snatchers.

And I was extremely impressed by his portrayal of troubled family man Calvin Jarrett in Ordinary People last fall. I felt that he was unjustly passed over at this

year's Oscars nominations for Best Actor.

Eye Of The Needle comes fast upon his triumphant performance in Ordinary People, and I am equally impressed with this new performance. His role in Eye Of The Needle is startlingly different from Calvin Jarrett in Ordinary People, demonstrating a versatility in Sutherland I would never have expected.

His role in Eye Of The Needle is that of Henry Faber, a cold-blooded and ruthless Nazi spy working in Britain during World War Two who went under the code name "The Needle". Faber's weapon is a sharp stilette knife which he shows no hesitation in using during the course of his work.

In the film, "The Needle" is being sharply hunted by British Intelligence, because it is believed that he has gained access to the Allied Plan to invade Normandy. While trying to navigate a small boat to a U-Boat which is waiting off the coast, the master spy is caught in a violent storm and ends up being shipwrecked on Storm Island off the coast of Scotland.

This remote island is inhabited by only a few people. Sutherland is found and nursed bath to health by a family who lives on the island. These people of course have no idea who the shipwrecked stranger is.

Here The Eye Of The Needle takes on the dimension of an offbeat love story as the killer spy becomes attracted to the man's repressed unhappy wife.

This latter role is superbly played by Kate Nelligan. From here on in, the suspense and action become particularly acute. The plot's many twists and turns will keep the audience off balance and on the edge of their seats.

The Eye Of The Needle is based on a best-selling novel by Ken Follett. In some ways it is reminiscent of another suspense thriller called The Day Of The Jackal, but I find this new movie to be superior in most ways.

I think the main difference is that in Day Of The Jackal, the assassin was an impersonal presence. We never really even got to know who he was.

In The Eye Of The Needle, much of the story is revealed from the assassin's viewpoint, and Sutherland's marvellous performance brings it to life.

We are also shown the viewpoint of the woman who falls in love with him, and the tension and relation between these two characters makes The Eye Of The Needle much more humanly interesting and dramatically satisfying.

According to police, a call was received at 7:55 a.m. Sunday that a boat and motor were being stolen by two male youths in another boat.


Later that day Smith's Camp Store on King Street was the object of a break, enter and theft involving an undetermined amount of cash.


As a result of the two incidences police arrested the two youths and charged Naves.



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
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
