Canada Savings Bonds for fair rate of return

If you hold Canada Savings Bonds, you're probably a little confused right now by all the rate changes that have taken place in recent months.

Little wonder since from November 1 last year the rate of return on your CSBs has been increased four times -- from 10.5 per cent to 11.5 per cent during last fall's campaign; 13.75 per cent on April 1; 16.25 per cent on June 1; and now to 18.5 per cent on August 1.

The latest increase applies for the three months ending Oct. 31, 1981. The rate of return payable after that date will be announced when the terms of the new fall series are made public in September.

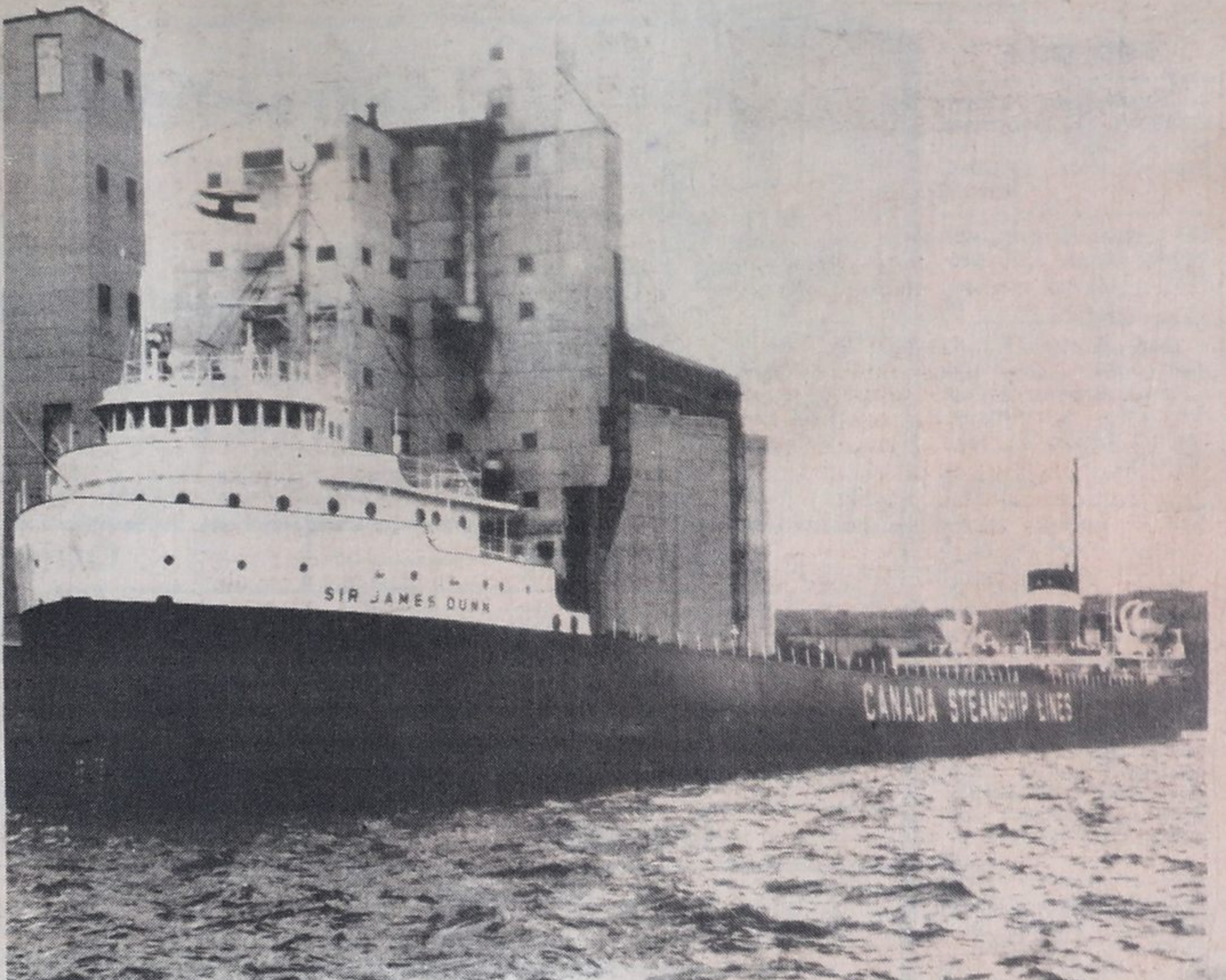
In making the announcement, Finance Minister MacEachen noted that the increase reflects the government's continuing commitment to insure that over time CSB holders receive a fair rate of return.

For holders of Regular Interest Bonds, the new higher interest will be paid November 1 either by cheque or by direct deposit to their banking accounts -- \$144.17 for every \$1,000 worth of Canada Savings Bonds you own.

On CSBs dated prior to 1977, the higher rate of return will be paid through an increase in the value of the cash bonus payable when these bonds mature.

In the case of Series 25, which matures this November 1, the bonus amounts to \$10.95 for every \$100 bond held. Other issues and their maturity dates are: Series 23 (1982) - \$18.15; Series 27 (1984) - \$25.18; Series 28 (1985) - \$30.65; Series 29 (1983) - \$10.60; Series 30 (1984) - \$14.13; and Series 31 (1985) - \$18.71.

In order to receive these bonuses, holders must keep their bonds until maturity.



Not unloaded here

Normally it can take as many as 16 members of Local 976 of the Brotherhood of Railway and Airline Clerks along with almost an equal number of longshoremen, working 15 hours a day for three days, to unload a ship like this in Midland. However the ship, Sir James Dunn, which arrived

Tay digs into pockets

Accounts totalling more than \$260,000 were approved for payment at the last regular meeting of Tay Township council.

Biggest chunk, \$187,671.64, was for capital works in connection with the current Waubaushene waterworks

construction program taking place in the hamlet.

In other money matters, Tay lawmakers approved a road voucher in the amount of \$92,166.88.

And it was agreed to call tenders for the supply of 4,000 tons of winter sand.

Anyone can get 'them' But you can shampoo problems away

In a few weeks your children will be returning to school after their summer holidays. In the past several years the communicable diseases of pediculosis (head lice) and scabies have been problems in the school, especially in the fall.

These infestations usually can be cured with adequate treatment. If not treated immediately or correctly, the disease can quickly spread to other schoolmates, as well as family and friends.

PEDICULOSIS - is caused by a head louse which is from two to four mm. in size, elongated in shape, grayish-white in colour, flat and wingless. The "live" louse lays nits or

eggs which are small and silvery and which attaches to the individual hairs. These nits or eggs hatch in about seven to nine days into new lice. It is important to break the cycle. Pediculosis cannot be caught from grass, trees or animals, but are transmitted from one infested person to another by direct contact with the hair or by using the same combs, brushes, towels, hats, scarves, hair ribbons or bedding as the infested person.

Anyone can catch pediculosis.

The most modern remedy is to use a special shampoo for pediculosis, which can be obtained at a pharmacy. All nits or eggs, whether dead or

live, must be removed from the hair by combing or brushing using clean combs and brushes. A metal fine toothed "nit" comb may be used or the nits can be pulled off the hair.

All personal items such as combs, brushes, hats, clothing and bedding should be either boiled or dry cleaned. If one person in a family or camp has head lice, there is a strong possibility that others will also. Therefore, everyone should be checked and the recommended treatment applied to all persons in the family or camp.

Head lice may be present anywhere on the scalp, but the back of the head and neck and behind the ears should

be checked first.

Remember, anyone can catch pediculosis, so please check your children's hair and your own.

SCABIES - is caused by a mite which burrows under the skin. The mite is white, eyeless, translucent, small, oval and flattened in appearance. Usually it lives in burrows dug in the superficial layers of the skin. These appear as very small, wavy, threadlike, slightly elevated, greyish-white burrows, most frequently present in the finger webs, wrists, waist area, buttocks, elbow and knee surfaces. There is intense itching, which worsens at night after the bed

has been warmed by the persons body heat.

Anyone can contract the mites. It is transmitted by close personal contact with an infested individual and takes about six weeks from the time of contact for symptoms to appear.

Reinfestation can occur.

All persons diagnosed as having scabies must be treated by a special lotion or cream which can be obtained at a

pharmacy. All members of the immediate household should be treated and all those whom they have come in contact with should be examined.

All clothing and bed linen used prior to treatment must be washed in hot water or dry-cleaned.

Please check your children for pediculosis and scabies before school begins.

Remember, anyone can catch pediculosis

and or scabies.
