Head injuries attributed:OPP

Police officers investigating the death of 24year-old Daniel McRae of Toronto say forensic tests have determined the man sustained severe head injuries around the time of his death and Constable Graham Thomson of Elmvale OPP say they are attributing death to those injuries.

According to Thomson, the man sustained a fractured skull as a result of those injuries but no other woulds were found on his body.

Investigators are presently interviewing known associates in the Regent Park area of Toronto in an effort to track down McRae's movements prior to his death, said the officer, but he added that those being questioned are unco-operative and information is slow coming in.

"There are five days prior to his death we can't

account for", noted Thomson.

The investigating group intend to remain in Toronto until they either discover the victim's movements during that time, or until all angles have been exhausted, he added.

It has been 26 days since a Flos resident discovered McRae's nude, partially decomposed body off an unused construction road south of Hillsdale.

A plastic covered wire, found wrapped around the man's feet led police to believe the man was bound at the time of his death.

Officer Thomson is being aided in his investigations by members of the Criminal Investigations Branch of the OPP out of Toronto.


Shot in arm for neighbour


