Tiny Township council met in a regular session on Wednesday to deal with an unusually light agenda.

Councillors John Butler and Ron Hamelin were unable to attend the meeting. Councillor Butler was in Toronto on business while Ron Hamelin had been admitted Penetanguishene General Hospital for a series of tests.

Mail Service

Delays in mail service were pointed out by council. The Clearwater Beach Association complained during a recent meeting with Reeve Morris Darby that election notices were not delivered to Toronto members until two weeks after the most recent municipal election.

More recently, a letter from the North Tiny Community Association dated May 19 was not received by the township until late August.

Airport Tiny's chief administrative officer, Guy Maurice, was appointed to attend future Huronia Airport meetings in place of Hamelin beginning with Wednesday night's meeting and until further notice.

Accounts

The following accounts were authorized by council: General Accounts for the month ending September 9 Roads \$74,844; Department \$20,979; Water Department \$18,279; Fire Department \$1,143; Parking" signposts \$3,872; Ainley and Associates (engineers) \$2,353.

Clearwater Beach Road In response to a request from the Clearwater Beach Association, the township bylaw naming "Lakeshore Road" has been amended to change the designation of the road. In future the road will be known officially as "Clearwater Beach Road" Tiny will pay 60 per cent

of the cost of necessary signs to be installed by the association.

> Volkswagen Tiny supported a

resolution originating from Georgina Township criticizing the federal government for its "interference" in the decision of Volkswagen Canada to locate a manufacturing plant in Barrie. According to the resolution, "the federal government should adopt a hands off' policy', in such matters.

Wyevale Pines Stop Sign


Tiny Township will go ahead and install two stop signs in the Wyevale Pines subfollowing division by local requests residents.

Allkindergartens full today

Children starting kindergarten at St. Joseph's School and Corpus Christi School in Penetanguishene this week won't meet all of their classmates until today.

This year the public school kindergarten classes started on a staggered schedule.

The 65 children registered at St. Joseph's School, and the 18 children registered at Corpus Christi School, went to school Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday this week in different groups.

St. Josephs School has about 10 more kindergarten students this year. The school's enrolment is 510.

With two less students in kindergarten, the afternoon kindergarten

class at Corpus Christi has been dropped. The morning class has 18 pupils.

Corpus Christi School's total population has only dropped about 10 students, almost exactly as statistics indicated, to 389 students.

In Penetanguishene's separate elementary schools, the kindergarten population has increased slightly. St. Ann's School's population stood at eight Wednesday, and St. Louis School's population at 11. Total population of St. Louis is 26.

The biggest change has been in the total population of St. Ann's School. In its second year the school has about 110 students, about double the number that it had when the school opened last September.
