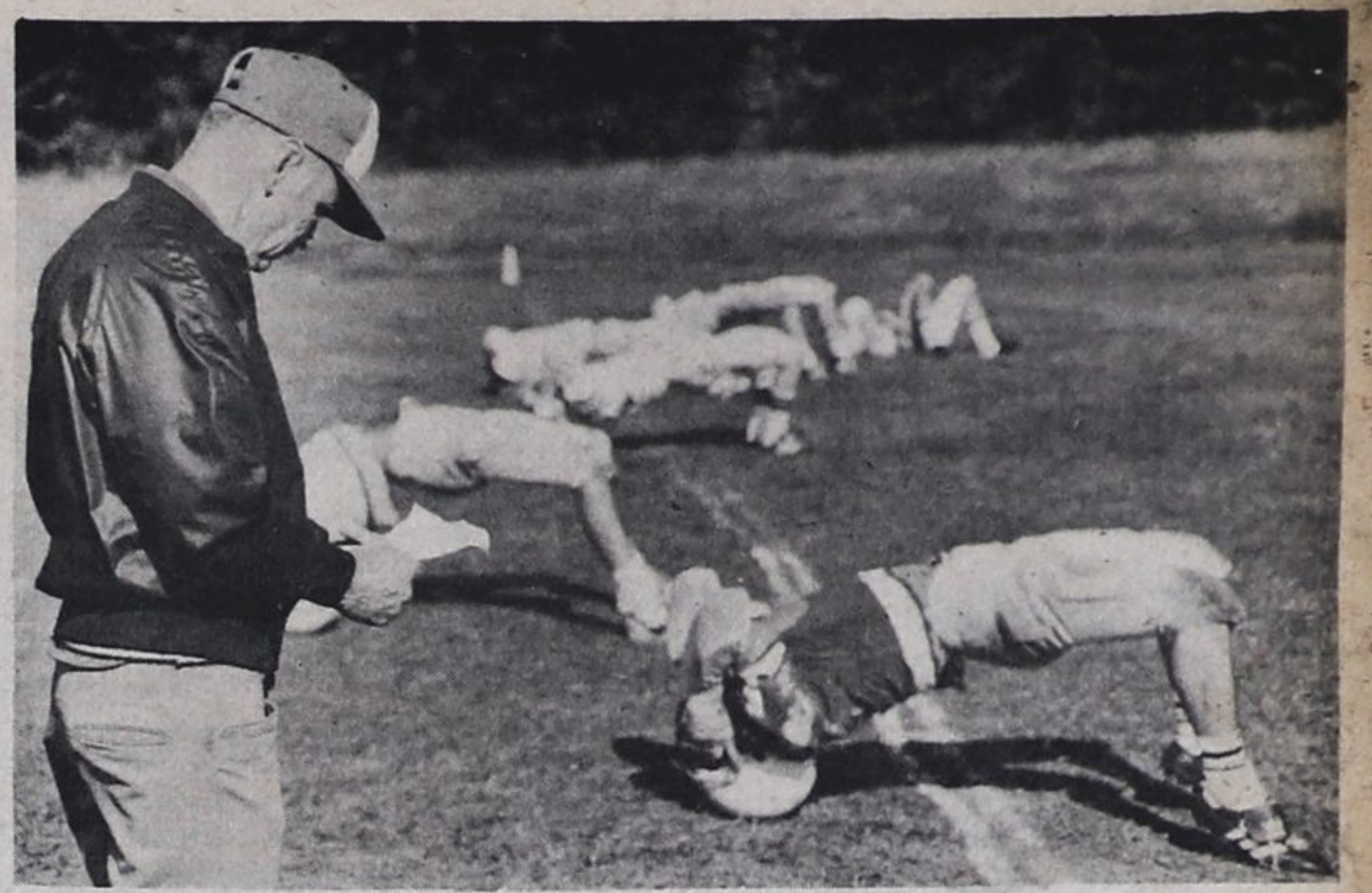

JUNIOR NAVIGATOR:

A two year study of celestial navigation, using celestial bodies to determine position and calculation of great circle courses between departure and destination, both theory and practice.
