

Apple Day had its start back in 1932

Annually, South Georgian Bay District has a fund-raising event called Apple Day. This year's Apple Day is scheduled for Oct. 24.

Purpose of Apple Day is to raise funds for either district, group or section of scouting. It should be made clear that scouts do not sell apples. A scout does not beg either, as something of value is given to donors.

In this case, a delicious, Canadian-grown apple is presented to every contributor in return for his donation. A tag is also given, to show that a person has helped scouting.

The origin of Apple Day occurred more than 40 years ago when a Canadian scout executive saw a similar project being operated by a Winnipeg service club.

On Jan. 30, 1932 this method of fund-raising was tried for the first time by scouts from Saint John, New Brunswick.

On that day, in 1932, there was a rain and sleet storm but 21,000 apples were sold, and since then, over one million dollars has been raised across Canada.

The Canada Community Development Projects (CCDP) program is designed to support local organizations in the development and management of activities that will create employment opportunities in specific, identified types of activity generally supportive of broader national priorities.

Such as? Energy conservation. Fisheries. Tourism development. Community restoration and development. Environmental conservation and reclamation. Development of local resources. Non-profit housing and rehabilitation. Native employment.

Services and jobs for the handicapped.

Who can apply? Community development associations. Service organizations. Co-operatives. Band Councils. Universities and community colleges. Businesses and partnerships. Municipalities where the province is in agreement. Individuals and newly-formed groups where these kinds of organizations are not available.

Who benefits? In a word, everyone! Because Canada Community Development Projects, introduced in 1980, is one of the options developed by the federal

government to create, in areas of higher unemployment, productive jobs enabling unemployed persons to use their skills in work of continuing and genuine value to the community.

More than just a temporary employment creation measure. CCDP will also particularly support project activities that maintain or increase continuing employment opportunities, as well as those that provide workers with skills to assist them in securing employment after participation in a project.

The bottom line. It is

estimated that the 1981-82 CCDP program will provide employment for 24,000 unemployed Canadians, with special emphasis on women, youth, Natives, and handicapped persons.

Where do you go from here? To learn more about the kinds of proposals the Canada Community Development Projects program is looking for, to determine your eligibility for sponsorship, and to obtain an application form, contact the nearest Canada Employment Centre.

Remember: the deadline for applications is October 9th.
