

ESPSS loss a 'moral victory'

Ecole Secondaire Penetanguishene Secondary School varsity football coach Larry Banks isn't going to let an 18-1 losing score overshadow the fact that his team outplayed powerhouse Collingwood Collegiate Institute Friday in Collingwood.

Collingwood, rated by Banks as 'probably the top team in the division,' scored on their two first possessions. But the inexperienced ESPSS defence weren't about to back out the door this time, and Collingwood was held scoreless for the final three quarters of play.

Meanwhile, ESPSS quarterbacks Dave Robillard and Jerome Ladouceur were completing half their passes and twice marched their rookie club to Collingwood's one yard line.

ESPSS' lone point came on a missed field goal attempt by Dave Genier.

'We consider it a moral victory,' said Banks, whose team was embarrassed 47-0 by Midland Secondary School in their last outing and have yet to win in three tries. 'We turned it right around on them with a combination of better play and a load of penalties by a very undisciplined Collingwood team.'

Banks' major goal, he says, is to show improvement on the MSS margin of victory when the two teams meet again Oct. 27 at ESPSS.

Before that, though, ESPSS will face Orillia's Park Street Collegiate - who beat MSS Friday - next week on home turf.

Midland hit at home

The two Midland entries in the Simcoe County Mens' Basketball League were walloped by the league's strongest clubs in an SCMBL home-opening doubleheader Thursday at Midland Secondary School.

The new Midland team, Dock Lunch, received the hardest knock, falling 103-42 in to the Stayner Mystics in their season opener.

Stayner finished in second place in league play last year, but many, including Dock Lunch team rep Brent Hamelin, are convinced the Mystics are even stronger this year - perhaps even strongest. 'They just ran us ragged,' said Hamelin. 'They're a powerhouse. They've got at least two guys starting up there at six-foot-six, and our guys are at six-two'

One team which might argue Stayner's supremacy is last year's champion Barrie Queen's Hotel, who put the shoes to the Midland Commodores 100-88 in the other half of the twin bill. The loss gives the Commodores an 0-2 record.

Jeff Attwood was top shooter for the Commodores with 20 points, while Marty McCrone led the visitors with 28. Next outing for the Dock Lunch squad is slated for Oct. 15 at Midland

Secondary School against Queen's. The Commodores will face the King City Stingers in their next contest Oct. 22, part of another MSS doubleheader with Dock Lunch.
