Tiny Township's Reeve Morris Darby is involved in several levels of government, and is finding his schedule a busy one.

As a representative of Simcoe County he attended the meeting of the Association of Counties and Regions of Ontario (ACRO) in Chatham from Oct. 18-21.

As the President of the Rural Ontario Municipalities Association (ROMA) he has been attending "a rash of meetings concerning the takeover of the new Association of Municipalities of Ontario" (AMO).

The new organization incorporates several sub-groups including ROMA, and the final transfer is to take place at the annual convention in February. The Reeve will remain on the executive of the new association as the Chairman of the Rural Section in 1982.

On dump site safety

Env. Minister Norton gives MPT his word

The Minister of the Environment for Ontario Keith Norton, has provided the Midland Penetanguishene Tiny Landfill Site Committee with written assurances concerning the safety of the Pauze dump and the question of liability for damages and remedial work which may be required.

In a letter dated Oct. 19, Norton advises that the study by Pauze's hydrologists indicates "the continued disposal of domestic waste...will not substantially aggravate any environmental problem at the site."

Henderson, Paddon, another consulting firm have concluded that "there is physical capacity for a further three years" at the Perkinsfield site, according to the Minister.

The Minister also promises to "keep a close watch on the completion of the Phase II study (by Morisson Beatty) to ensure there are no undue delays." "The District Office will be en-

suring that the site is operated in accordance with the Act...and will support it in any enforcement action which becomes necessary," the letter continues.

The Ministry will "advise you (M.P.T.) as the successive parts of the close-off work...are satisfactorily completed."

On the question of liability, the Minister states "In the event it becomes necessary to lay any charges with respect to the operation of the site, the Minister would regard the site operator as being responsible and would not lay charges against any of the municipalities."

Finally, Norton says "I trust your arrangements with Mr. Pauze will proceed more amicably then (sic) in the recent past until you have a new site and that your Committee will proceed expeditiously with obtaining the necessary approvals for one."

The letter is signed simply "Keith".
