Opera for average person promised

Barber of Seville on Nov. 14

The Canadian Opera Company will bring to Midland "not mink and pearls but something that means something to you and your families," Irene Wronski told Midland and District Rotarians Wednesday.

Ten singers and seven technicians from the Canadian Opera Company Ensemble will be in Midland on Nov. 13 and Nov. 14, Wronski, the ensemble's co-ordinator, said.

The highlight of the two-day visit, part of an extended tour by the ensemble of the Georgian Bay Region, will be a performance of The Barber of Seville, in English, at Midland Secondary School.

People who think of opera in terms of soap opera, and operatic behaviour, should think again, said Michael Howell, the ensemble's

publicist. Opera is entertainment, he said. The Barber of Seville was described as a fast-moving comedy that has as elements a case of mistaken identity, disguises, and characters going through the wrong doors, Rotarians were told.

On Nov. 13 the ensemble will be putting on two workshops for public school students that will actively involve the students. In late afternoon, a Broadway style performance of Little Red Riding Hood will be mounted at Midland Secondary School.

A dinner at the Budd Watson Gallery Friday evening will be followed by a concert of highlights from a number of operas.

Public school students will take part in the workshops Friday. Singers will work with

students on a funny scene from The Barber of Seville.

Little Red Riding Hood Friday afternoon will also be in English. The wolf will have some characteristics of Fred Astaire.

Flooding of property

Ingram Cr. man annoyed

By a vote of 5-3, Midland council earlier this week agreed to arrange a meeting between its public works committee, the town, Simcoe County Board of Education officials and Vic Wilcox of 979 Ingram Cr.

In one of the most eloquent one-man deputations ever before council in recent memory, Wilcox told of a long history of flooding that has taken place on his property and the steps he has taken to reduce it.

He indicated in no uncertain terms his wish to not allow public works personnel to trespass on his property to remove a plug placed in a drainage pipe on his property.

Wilcox noted, since the school board had developed a playing field at the back of his home he has had nothing but problems.

Those problems were compounded with the development of a mall on the east side of Highway 27.

Water that collects at both sites during heavy rain storms eventually find their way to the Wilcox property.

It was suggested the town would have to spend as much as \$1 million to correct the problem by installing a storm sewer system along both Hugel

Avenue, west of the high school and along Ingram Cr.

Wilcox showed photographs of huge pools of water on his property and in one picture showed council people actually riding in a canoe on a lake that had been formed after a heavy downpour.

Saying he needed support in fighting the school board to have the matter corrected, Wilcox observed, he could not risk personal bankruptcy.

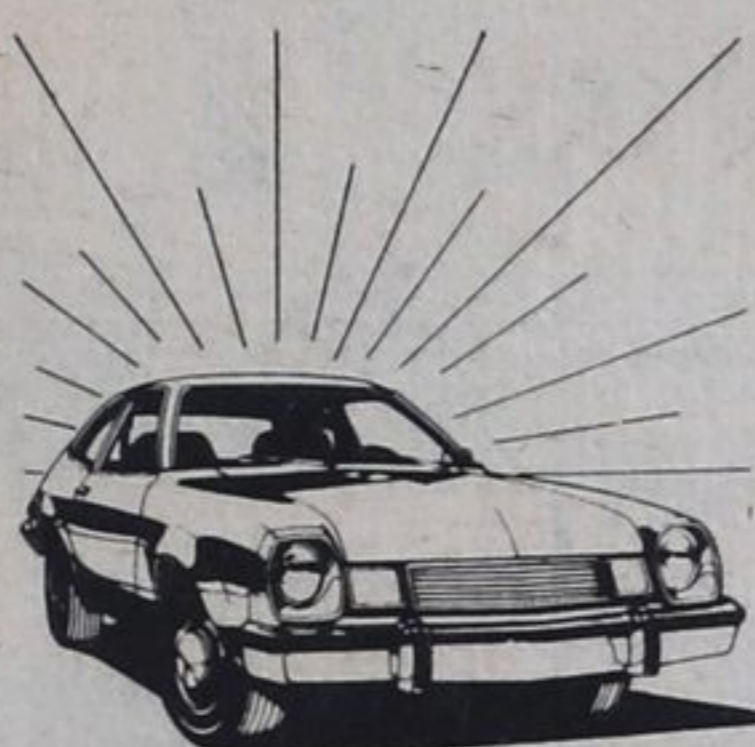

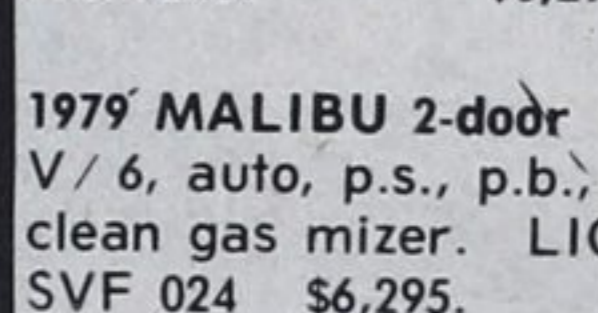

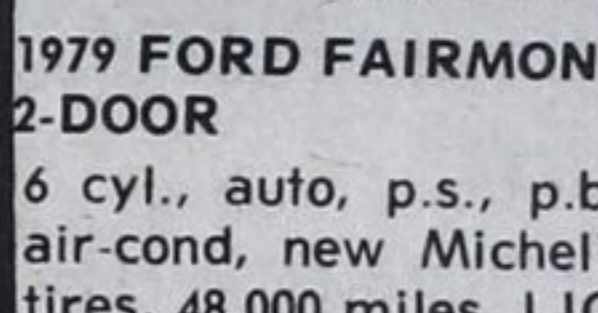
