They had, alas, no way of knowing Park was going to blow it the next day.

Today, then, as Collingwood and Twin Lakes practice for Tuesday's Simcoe County semi-finals, MSS and Park -- which turned the ball over to Twin Lakes eight times in the 18-14 Wednesday upset -- are kicking themselves on the sidelines.

MSS, according to coach Randy Ritchie, "still should have won"

Tuesday's game over ESPSS, despite his allowance that Penetanguishene were keyed up to the facemask after their awful embarrassment earlier in the season.


