The car in which the five people were riding was wrecked after it rolled on level ground while on Katgewin Road near the Government Dock.

**Sees need to centralize gas tanks in Midland**

Midland's Advisory and Administrative Committee is to consider a centralized depot for obtaining gas since the town's new police cruisers, to be delivered Nov. 1, will require unleaded gas which is not available at the gas pumps located at the municipal building.

Since police cars in the town use about 800 gallons of fuel a month, the town's public safety committee has suggested a central depot be set up for gassing up police, fire, public works and PUC vehicles.
