


New elbow

Last Thursday at Midland Arena, leagueleading Collingwood Shipbuilders unloaded a 9-3 loss on the A's.

Scoring for Midland were McMann, Spiker, and Bruce Guthrie.

Craig Watson guarded the Midland net that evening.

Midland may have to face the Terriers Friday (game time 8:30 p.m.) with only ten skaters.

If they come out of it with a win, they'll have a chance to move up the league ladder next Wednesday when they travel to Barrie for another shot at the Flyers.
