THE PROBLEM - Kid gloves are on for acid removal

It seems likely that the 39 tons of hydrofluoric acid in the derailed CP Rail tanker in a ravine beside CP Rail's main line through Medonte Township will remain where it is until next week according to information from the Ontario Solicitor-General.

Wednesday, Solicitor-General George Taylor said the job of removing ice and debris from the derailment site so that two CP Rail cranes could get at the tank car was proceeding less swiftly than expected.

The day before at the previous press conference it was announced that an attempt to move the tanker, or to drain it, would be made Wednesday.

On Wednesday afternoon Taylor said it is likely that the acid will

be transferred through steel piping into another tank car. The alternative is to pick up the derailed tanker and transport it through heavily populated sections of Ontario to the Allied Chemical Plant near Windsor, he said.

Taylor estimated that between eight and 12 hours will be needed to transfer the acid. One day, perhaps as early as yesterday, would be spent turning the tanker over so that the dome and valves in the top can be examined.

Transfer of the acid would be done on another day, or perhaps spread over two days, depending on the circumstances of the

transfer, which will be done in full daylight hours.

The evacuation order for the immediate area and the approximate 30 residents remains in effect.

CP Rail trains will be using the track during the night when the workmen clearing the wreckage are sleeping, CP Rail representative Steve Morris said. CP Rail is using an agreement between

itself and Canadian National Railways to divert its trains around the problem area on Canadian National Railway track during the daylight hours.

During the actual transfer of acid, the area of the derailment will be cleared except for eight firemen, two chemical experts, and a lesser complement than the normal complement of 12 that operates each of the two cranes that will be used.

The Solicitor-General also announced that Medonte Township will be reimbursed all of its costs of fighting the fire that resulted from the derailment, the direct costs of the fire department, and the indirect costs as well, such as food for firefighters and fuel for vehicles. Medonte Township should "not have to bear the cost," Solicitor-General the said.
