Swales, who - also attracted a lot of attention with her own gritty style, will be back in the St. Theresa's court in the fall, a fact which - no matter what the outcome of her provincial team bid will make her one of the busiest volleyball ladies around next season.

Snow changes the rules

Proposed amendments to the Motorized Snow Vehicles Act were outlined in the legislature by Ontario Transportation and Communications Minister James Snow.

"The changing situation is reflected by the re-definition of the term public trails to facilitate the continued wide application of safety and licensing regulations, said.

Essentially, the revised definition deletes all reference to public funding.

Under the amendments, drivers fo snowmobiles on the newly-defined trails must be at least 12 years old and hold a motorized snow vehicle operator's licence. Those 16 and over can use a valid driver's licence.
