

# Locals have good start

Midland Indusmin scored a convincing 4-1 victory over the Midland Autos as the two clubs kicked off their 1982 Barrie and District Soccer League season Wednesday at Midland Secondary School.

Andy Munro opened the scoring for Indusmin 21 minutes into the first half after taking a pass from Gord Fleming and blasting a high shot past Autos goaltender Gunther Schmidt.

Keith Duval headed in a cross-field pass from Dennis Moreau to give Indusmin a virtually insurmountable 3-0 lead ten minutes into the second half, but the Autos fought back and came up with a goal on a penalty kick by John Ingerselli shortly after duval's marker.

Fleming put it away for Indusmin, though, when, with only five minutes remaining, he slammed a screaming ground-level shot past Schmidt from midfield.

Dave Downs was in net for Indusmin. The two Midland squads will combine forces Sunday for an exhibition match at MSS against a Sudbury club. The Midland team will consist of seven players from undusmin and seven Autos.

That one will get underway at 2 p.m.

Next BDSL game for Indusmin is slated for next Wednesday at MSS against Barrie Derk's Ralings. Kickoff is 6:45 p.m.

The same evening, the Autos will travel to Barrie for their second league encounter against Barrie Town and Country.

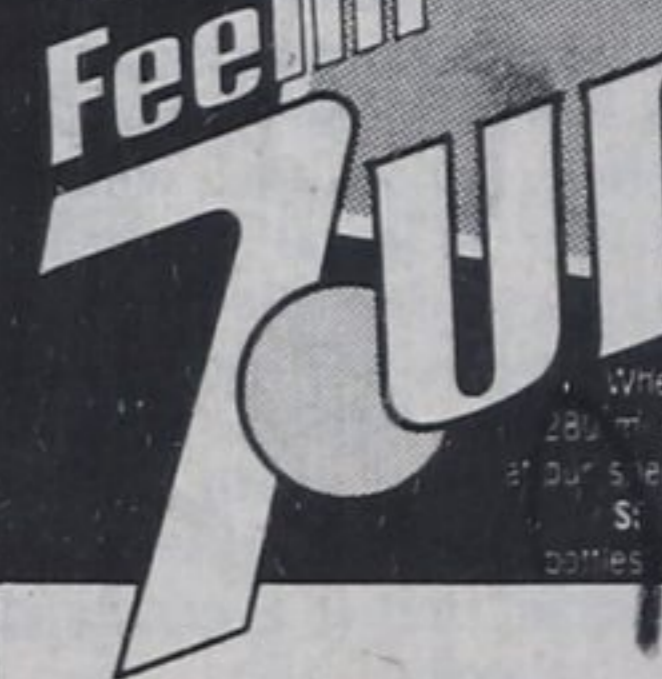
