Daring daylight incident

Looking for suspect who indecently assaulted girl

Penetanguishene police say they have a good description of a male suspect who was involved in an indecent assault of a 18-year-old Penetanguishene female in the town last Saturday morning.

Police Chief Dennis Player reports, that as the girl was walking along Main Street at about 9 a.m., she was attacked from the front by a young man who then fled.

Police here are working with the Ontario Provincial Police's Identification Branch in an effort to come up with a composite drawing of the attacker.

Meanwhile police are conducting investigations into three weekend break-ins. Two occurred at schools in the town while the third happened at a 14 Viel St., home.

Nothing was taken, police say, from break-ins at St. Ann's School and Corpus Christi School but personal property and \$200 in cash was taken during the Viel Street home break-in.

And police are still looking for a car that smashed into a parked vehicle on the weekend on Maria Street, the parked car sustained \$400 damage. The second car reportedly left the scene after the collision.

Meanwhile a \$1,000 amp was stolen from a 122 Robert St. East home on the weekend. It was rented from a music store in Midland.

The late Dr. Jury will be remembered

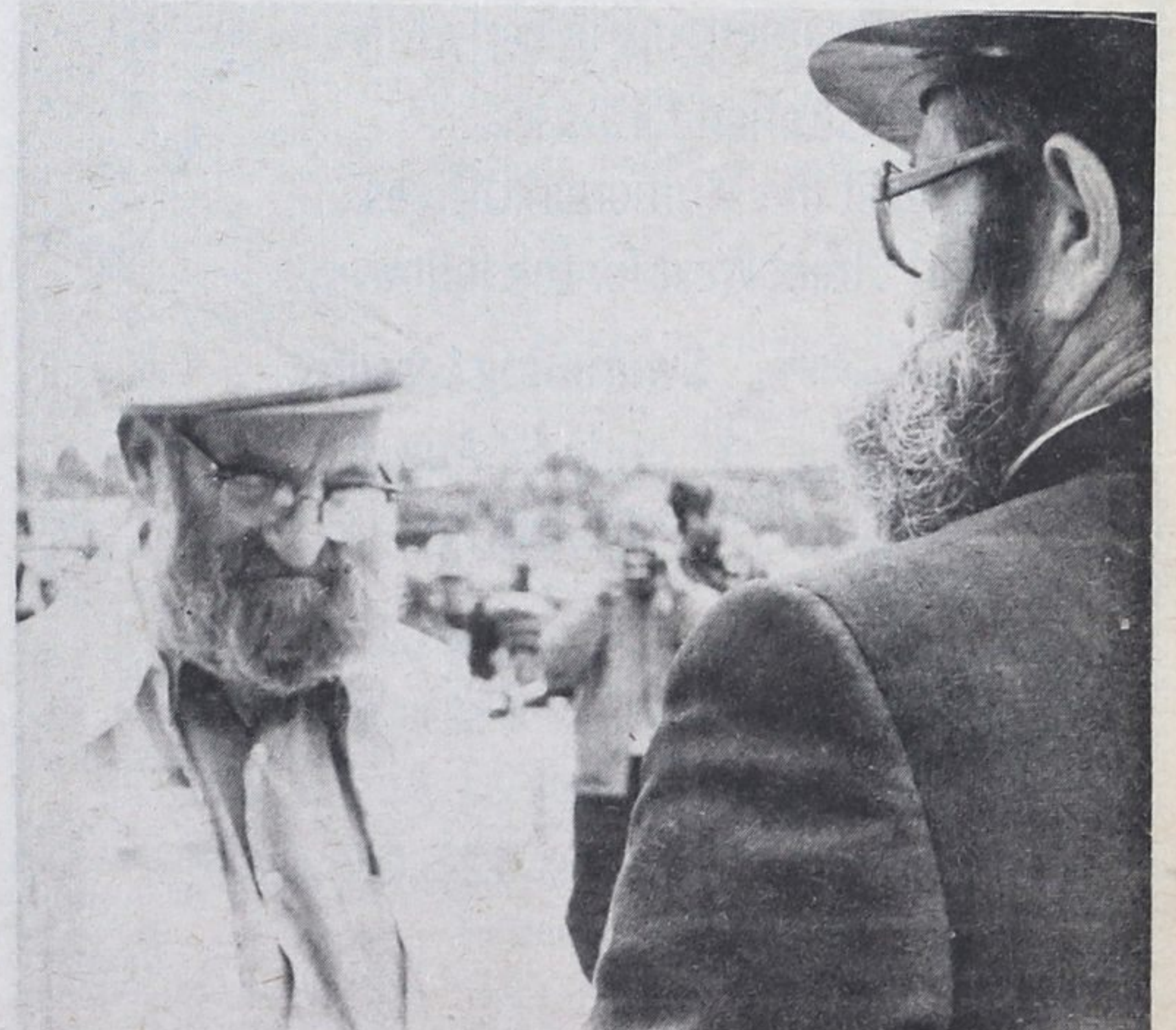
