

# \$74,684.50 set aside for turning circle

Reconstruction of the turning circle at Penetanguishene dock will be done by Robert and George Bidan Construction, Ltd.

The Bidan tender at \$74,684.50 was the lowest of eight tenders submitted to the town for consideration.

At a special meeting of council held Monday night "to get things rolling as soon as possible," Mayor Bellisle explained "the reconstruction shouldn't disrupt business at the dock, since traffic will be re-routed but never closed off."

Town engineering consultants, Reid and Associates "have checked on the

availability of equipment, and with several people for whom this contractor has performed work, and find no cause to recommend rejection of his low tender."

A 75 per cent subsidy on the project from the Ministry of Transportation and Communications is payable only on the low tender, according to town clerk Yvon Gagne.

The re-construction of Main Street from Nelson Street to the waterfront and the construction of a new dock parking lot will begin almost immediately, requiring six weeks to complete.
