According to Mrs. Barker, "the conference pointed out the interesting fact that most of the parent support programmes grew out of the parents' own awareness of theirneeds during the preschool years and developed through their own initiative and skills."

Although consultants are used when appropriate, "Parents are discovering their own ability to strengthen and enrich their family life by working together," says Mrs. Barker.

workshop ideas and information gained at the Ottawa conference will be put to use in the local playcentres.

Mrs. Barker notes that the two local playcentres have attracted a variety of personalities and awareness in their clientele, and that "anybody interested in hhe care of childrenin the early years" is welcome to participate. The Midland centre could be used everyday of the week on the basis

of demand of the facility.

Volunteers to assist in the organizations would be welcome, as well. "With volunteers, more neighbourhood playcentres could open," she says.

Mrs. Barker stresses the importance of adult company in child play. The new family resource provided bylocal playgroups is a means of counteracting the isolation and loneliness felt by many parents in the home. "The stimulation of ideas and support gained at the playgroups provides a feeling of well-being, and helps parents to feel better about parenting," says Mrs. Barker.
