## Two males arrested curling club lounge fire

Two Penetanguishene-area men have been charged in connection with a fire that ripped through the Penetanguishene Curling Club's lounge during the wee small hours of June 19. That blaze caused an estimated \$65,000 damage although initial damage figures had been set at \$80,000.

As a result of a continuing investigation by Penetanguishene police arrests were made on the weekend.

Charged with two counts of break and enter and one count of mischief to public property is Morris J. Bu'tineau, 21, of Champlain Road.

Also charged with one count of break and enter and one count of possession of stolen property is Richard J. Patenaude, 19, of RR 2, Penetanguishene.

Warrants to arrest three other youths in connection with the fire and break-in have been issued, Police Chief Dennis Player said this week.

Meanwhile police and fire authorities are continuing their investigation into last month's \$800,000 fire which gutted Bay Moorings Dining Lounge in Penetanguishene.

That five-hour two-alarm inferno was fought by firefighters

from both Penetanguishene and Midland.
