# Dusome clan flocks to park for reunion

It was one of those rare summer days last Saturday at Midland Little Lake Park when the people actually outnumbered the sea gulls.

The occasion was the Dusome family reunion, an event that takes place every five years in town.

Following afternoon mass at St. Margaret's Roman Catholic Church the Dusome clan converged at the park for a picnic and sports day.

These reunions are the brainchild of William and Camilla (nee Jewitt) Murphy of Yonge Street West,

Midland.

Saturday the heirs of the first Dusome family were able to trace their family tree back to 1697 which delighted the more than 100 people from one to 93 who attended the gala affair.

Guisseaume Family Signory of St. Ours 1697 The family name Dusome appears to

have originated from

the name Guisseaume (Guis(s)e(Aume). It is believed (by some) that they came from the town of Guise, in the department of Aisne, (Picardy, near St. Quentin) in France, which had a population

of approximately 6,000. Claudia De Guise was believed to be the son-in-

law of King Francis of France. Marie de Guise of the court of James V of Scotland was the mother of Mary Stuart. (Mary Queen of Scots)

The first Dusome to come to this area was Francois who along with a brother, volunteered to take their father's place when he was called up for the army.

They left Kingston in February, 1814 with a force led by Lt. Col. Robert McDouall of the Glengary Light Infantry. The force consisted of 28 seamen,

11 artillary men, four field guns and two companies of the Royal Newfoundland regiment.

They journeyed up Lake Ontario to York, north on Yonge Street to Lake Simcoe and Holland Landing. They then crossed Lake Simcoe to Barrie, portaged to Willow Creek and stopped at Nottawasaga.

While at Nottawasaga, they constructed 30 bateaux. In April, 1814 bateaux laden, they broke ice and reached Georgian Bay. It took them 19 days to cross the ice

fields and on May 18 they arrived at Fort Michilimackinac.

They lost one bateau but men and supplies were saved. On Aug. 14, the Americans under Croghan and Sinclair attacked Fort Michilimackinac but were defeated by the British, aided by the Indians and the French couriers des bois.

Mackinac was evacuated in July, 1815 by the British and the French and returned to the Americans.

The French settled on Drummond Island and stayed until 1828 at which time the Border Commission awarded Drummond Island to the Americans. While on Island Drummond many of the Frenchmen married Indians and half-breeds.
