## More people make use of office

The office of the Ontario ombudsman, Donald R. Morand, received approximately 10 per cen' more complaints and information requests this year than the previous year, his ninth annual repor for the period April, 1981 to March, 1982, shows. Further, the office of the ombudsman has reduced he number of investigations carried over at yearend to 1,457. This is the lowest carryover of in-progress cases since the office began functioning in the fall of 1975.

During he ninth reporting period, the office closed a 'otal of 10,175 complaints and information requests.

The majority of these were closed within several months of their receip!, Morand's office reports. In fact, 7,164 or 70 per cen! were handled within one month. Eighty-eight per cent or 8,947 were closed within six months of heir receip a the ombudsman's office.

Since Morand's ap-

pointment, approximately three years ago. cost of living increases to employees and other standard increases in the cost of services and supplies have affected the yearly budge. However, when hese increases are compu ed, Morand's office states that the overall office expenditures for this three year period are approximately \$250,000 less than the above mentioned increases. In times of fiscal restraint, he states he is naturally proud of his accomplishment. Along with hese savings, Morand reports that he has still been able to increase he number of employees conducting

investigations. Morand further reports that members of his staff held private hearings in more communities this year han ever before. Overall, staff members

of the office of the ombudsman visited 76 communities provincewide in this reporting period. As in previous years, members of the staff from the Directorate of Regional Services continued to visi Indian Reserves and settlements in Ontario in order to offer he services of the ombudsman to our native population.




