

Eight from area win special medals

Eight athletes from Huron Park Public School and the Midland Adult Rehabilitation Centre earned medals at last weekend's 1982 Ontario Special Olympics track and field championships in Toronto.

More than 220 athletes from 12 Ontario regions took part in the event, a qualifying competition for next summer's International Games in Baton Rouge, Louisiana.

All eight Midland athletes, representing Region 6 (from Richmond Hill to Muskoka), ranked high in their events and age groups, but final selection of the team for the International Games won't take place at least until

fall. The Baton Rouge games will also include floor hockey, bowling, swimming and several other events.

Cindy Cruise of the Midland ARC led the local contingent with five medals. She won the gold medal in the 200 metre run, silvers in the 100 metre dash and 400 metre run, and bronze medals in the running long jump and high jump events.

Vince Patterson of the ARC won a gold in the 200 metre run and silvers in the running long jump and 400 metre run.

Other ARC representatives were Bernard Moreau, who earned a gold in the 100 metre run and a bronze in the 200 metres; Paul

Moreau, with a gold in the running long jump and a bronze in the 100 metres; and Marty Dell, who brought home bronze medals in the standing long jump and running long jump.

Other Huron Park participants were Louise Dignard, who put in a gold-medal performance in the ball throw, picked up a silver in the 200 metres and a bronze in the running long jump, and Mike Lacroix, who won a silver medal in the running long jump and a bronze in the 400 metres.

Toronto Plast won that one with a 15-12, 15-7 dunking of the Toronto Wizzards in the final.

Patti Cox, Jean Goodrow, Viki Baziliauskos and Sue Presse were the local reps in the ladies' division. They also finished fourth, with the Bears, a squad made up of players from the top Junior team in Canada, defeating Toronto R&B 15-8, 15-6 in the championship.
