John, who has lived in Nashville the last two years, began his musical career at the age of 12, but he's come a long way since the local high school band he originated back at EDHS.


He graduated from there to become lead singer and guitarist for one of Canada's top country bands, Whiskey River, and from there to musical director for Global TV's Tim Daniels Show.

The first-ever event for the newly-formed club was originally scheduled as a doubles affair but was reshaped into a singles format due to a shortage of players.




