\$40,000 shot in the arm

OHRP grant for Nottawasaga Twp.

A \$40,000 Ontario Renewal Home Program (OHRP) grant for Township of Notlawasaga was announced today by MPP George McCague (Dufferin-Simcoe) on behalf of Municipal wish to bring their Affairs and Housing Minister Claude Benneit.

Nottawasaga is one of 14 municipalities receiving a total of more than \$539,000 in provincial OHRP funding.

Administered by municipalities, the program assists homeowners to upgrade their homes, with the emphasis on faulty structural and sanitary conditions, and on plumbing, insulation, heating and electrical systems.

Loans of up to \$7,500 are made to eligible owner-occupants who homes up to standard. A portion of a loan may be forgiven, depending on the recipient's in-Interest rates range from zero to eight again cent, depending on income.

For applicants, the maximum annual qualifying income, after allowable deductions are made, is \$15,500.

Bennett said that since OHRP was

launched in 1974, more than \$148 million in provincial funds have been given to 702 municipalities across the province, and to individuals in unorganized commu-

"That translates into repairs being carried out with OHRP financial incentives in more than 35,200 homes. It's a measure of the program's success and popularity," he said.

OHRP benefits are available to eligible owner-occupants in all municipalities which have adopted minimum housing standards bylaws or resolutions

establishing standards, and have decided to take part in the program. In comwithout munities municipal boundaries, OHRP is administered by the Ministry of Municipal Affairs and Housing's housing programs division in conjunction with the Ministry of Northern Affairs.

OHRP is one of the province's major renewal initiatives intended to assist municipalities and the private sector in conserving and recycling existing resources through community renewal activities.

Some interest in RCA plant
