FACTS

Facts and figures are an interesting part of an undertaking of this magnitude.

Waubaushene has a total population of 800, of which 500 are permanent residents.

During construction of the new

water system, 30,000 feet of new water main were installed, to which 443 services were joined.

A total of 38 new fire hydrants were added to replace the 12 existing fire plugs.

The new water tower on the skyline has a capacity of 300,000 gallons which is a substantial increase from the old water tower.

The new filtration plant and pump house facility has a daily treatment capacity of 270,000 gallons.

9.6 km of streets in Waubaushene have now been reconstructed

In 1977, Tay Township ceased any major roadwork in Waubaushene.

By January '79 the design report had been completed and submitted to the Ontario Municipal Board for approval.

In October 1980, having received O.M.B. approval the design was completed and tenders were let in November '80. Contractors were hired and contracts signed in December '80 and construction began in earnest in April '81.

The project was completed and put into operation in December

With the arrival of spring in 1981, there was also the arrival of three construction companies in Waubaushene.

Omega Construction of London began work on the distribution system.

E.T.S. Contracting of Hamilton were responsible for the construction of the new water tower and the eventual demolition of

the smaller out-dated

Rono Construction of Barrie was hired to construct the pump house and filtration plant at the north end of Pine Street.

By summer '81, construction was well underway.

During the summer of '81, while some of the water main installation had been completed, the task of re-building and paving all of the streets began.

In addition to re-

paving, additional drainage, including 558 meters of storm sewers and 1.8 kilometers of asphalt gutters were added.

The re-construction of a total of 9.6 kilometers of streets gobbled up 20,336 tons of crushed limestone and 8,991 tons of asphalt.

Catch basins, new culverts and all new ditching were added to complete the project.

The total cost of street renovations was partially covered by a 65 per cent grant from the Ministry of Transportation and Communications, with Tay Township absorbing the

remaining 35 per cent of the cost.





Up-front funds sure helped

The total cost of the new distribution system in Waubaushene amounted to a resounding \$1,870,000.00.

Tay Township received up-front grants from the Ministry of the Environment totalling \$1,272,090.00.

The Waubaushene P.U.C. made a direct contribution to the cost of \$40,000. from its reserves, leaving Tay Township with a long term debt of approximately \$550,000.00 owing on the total cost.
