Kettle's Beach

Ratepayers Association Corrie Hamelin, secretary of the Kettle's Beach Ratepayer's Association, thanked Tiny Township councillors for "their continued interest in, and concern for, the people of our area," in a letter addressed to Guy Maurice, administrator.

"We especially appreciate the considerable expense of the Awenda Park road study, undertaken by you, regarding our transportation problems," the letter continued. "We are aware that a good deal of effort is required on the part of the Township Roads Department, in order to keep our road through the Park in fair condition. Please convey our appreciation to the personnel concerned."

The beach association stated they had one outstanding request, for reduced speed limit signs on the road. "Nonresident traffic, driving at speeds well beyond 50 km., is creating a dangerous situation for our residents, especially our children," the letter said.

Council was informed that the requested speed limit signs have been placed on the road.

A resolution was passed by Council approving the recommendation by Planning Board that the Planning Director will be delegated to attend the Ontario Planner's Conference. The Conference, sponsored by the Ministry of Municipal Affairs and Housing, will be held in Toronto on Sept. 23-24.

Conversion Application Fee -

The municipality will begin charging a fee of \$50, effective January '83, to the ratepayer requesting to have his "Seasonal Dwelling" classified as a "Permanent Home."

Soldier's Monument Ceremony


The annual memorial service at the Soldier's Monument in Waverley will be held this year on
