Strike could beavoided

A ratification meeting has been scheduled for Tuesday, Aug. 31 at which time results of Monday's day-long conciliation meeting in Barrie between the Simcoe County Board of Education and Local 330 of the Ontario Public Service Employees Union will be discussed.

Local 330 which represents 247 support staff associated with SCBE has been without a contract since the end of June.

At issue is money and working in a new one-year collective agreement for SCBE support staff who are mainly secretaries connected with both elementary and secondary (SCBE) schools in Simcoe County.

This week's conciliation meeting was chaired at the Continental Inn in Barrie by Warren Edmonson who was picked by the Ministry of Labour to mediate the labour dispute.

The Monday session which commenced at 10 a.m. wrapped up more than eight hours later, an OPSEU official told The Times yesterday from her Orillia office.

She wouldn't comment further on this week's conciliation meeting other than to say, "There will be a ratification meeting at Eastview Collegiate in Barrie on Aug. 31." At that time we will tell the members what went on."

Church St. residents to get goodnews this week

Residents of Church Street, who appeared at the July 26 meeting of Penetanguishene Council to ask for street improvements and reduced traffic, will be happy to note that a bylaw has been amended to prohibit heavy trucks on their street.

Fox Street is included in the

amendment.

Service vehicles making deliveries to residents of these streets are exempt from the restriction. All other heavy trucks, such as those making deliveries to the Mental Health Centre, must use an alternate route, effective immediately.

Another amendment to the bylaw prohibits parking on Robert Street East, south side, from Lucy Street to Lorne Avenue.

Meanwhile council voted to declare the week of Sept. 13 to 18 as Arthritis Week in Penetanguishene. Bluebird Flag, symbol of the Arthritis Society, will be raised before the Town Hall on or before Sept. 8, to announce the start of the fund-raising campaign week. CITIZEN BRIEFLY

Communicants found guilty

Local Catholics who prefer to kneel to receive communion will be particularly in-

terested in a recent legal case in Nova Scotia. Six worshippers there who refused to stand to take communion were taken to court and convicted of wilfully disturbing the order and solemnity of a religious worship service.

Fr. John Hawkshaw says that 99 per cent of the Catholics in the Toronto Archiocese, which includes Elmvale, stand to receive communion. Commenting on the Nova Scotia case, he said, "There's much more to it than kneeling for communion."

Fr. Hawkshaw recalled a case in New York, in what church he didn't know, in which a parishioner was banned from the church because of her off-key singing. "Some crazy things happen," he said.
