

Expects statement Monday on Pritchard

The first statement concerning the position of Huronia District Hospital administrator since former administrator Ted Pritchard was fired last week will be issued during the hospital's annual meeting Monday night, board chairman Elaine Nicholls said Wednesday.

There's still been no official comment on the reasons Pritchard was fired last Monday night during an in-camera meeting following a regular board meeting.

Nicholls said ads seeking a replacement for Pritchard were placed in the professional sections of the Toronto Star and The Globe and Mail last weekend. The ads were placed by HDH personnel director Jack Bernard and were, said Nicholls, "just to announce that we were looking."

"It's not something we're pursuing vigorously or very quickly at this moment in time," Nicholls added, saying ads would be placed in local papers as well in the near future.

Meanwhile, Pritchard says he's still in the dark about the reasons for his firing. The publically-funded facility's first administrator (the only one since the hospital opened in 1976) said yesterday he's "still trying to get the reasons".

Pritchard also said he discussed the matter with his lawyer last week and will pursue the discussions when his lawyer is available again next week.

In a telephone interview yesterday with The Times, Platt said he "plans to make a final decision on the matter towards the end of the month."
