# Platt's goals if elected Prudent management, financial restraint

Alderman Richard Platt officially tossed his hat into the mayor's race by announcing yesterday afternoon during a new conference at Midland town hall that he plans to seek the mayor's chair this November.

The following is the text of the prepared statement he made to the media.

I intend to be a candidate for mayor in the November 1982 municipal elections. Midland is facing difficult times. Plant closings are shrinking the tax base and at the time high same unemployment is making the burden of property taxes heavier for many ratepayers.

A program of prudent management and financial restraint is essential if many are not to suffer hardship. All municipal expenditures must be scrutinized to ensure

that maximum value is being obtained for the tax dollar. Municipal practices must be and examined evaluated to determine if changes in established ways of doing things can deliver equivalent services at reduced

The municipal staff organization must be reviewed to ascertain if changes in structure will result in necessary improvements in efficiency and in staff morale. Financial restraint and prudent management must be

the immediate response to the tough times which lie ahead, but if Midland is to have a chance for a healthy economic future we must continue, unabated, our efforts to bring diversified industrial development to the Town.

We have suffered bitter disappointments and set-backs. Many industrial jobs pumping millions of dollars annually into the local economy have been lost. The economic consequences are being felt and will continue to be felt throughout the area. We must not let these disappointments discourage us from continuing the search for industrial growth.

Tourism is a vital part of the local economy and must be promoted and encouraged enthusiastically. But tourism alone is in-

sufficient to provide an acceptable standard of living for most Midlanders. Industrial growth, preferably in the form of small diversified industry, must be our constant goal.

I have held elected office in Midland for eight years; two years as public utilities commissioner and for the past six years as alderman.

I have been chairman of the finance committee since 1979. My aim has always been to provide prudent financial management; to keep taxes at acceptable levels, to provide adequate services at an affordable cost, yet to ensure that the capital necessary projects to accommodate future growth were provided for.

The Platt family has lived in Midland for 16 years. There is no finer small town in Ontario.

I feel a sense of community with my fellow citizens and I and my family are facing the same problems so many of them are having.

If elected mayor I will work to promote policies which are in the interests of the majority of ratepayers; to live prudently within our means and to do all in my power to organize the various of the resources municipality in a concerted and continuing effort to bring industrial jobs to the Richard Platt Town.

The best bet is that wage restraints will differ from the federal government's 6 and 5 (two-year) package and be along a 9 and 5 line.


#### Reeve Walker says he'll seek re-election
