

Crusaders hold their banner high

The St. Theresa's High School volleyball teams were up to their traditional winning ways again on the weekend as they took home championships in two divisions and

narrowly missed in the other final of the Midland-Huron Volleyball Club High School Invitational. The Crusaders carried off the Senior division crown with a 15-

10 final victory over Barrie Central Collegiate and the St. T's Junior "A" team - one of three Junior teams entered by the school -- dumped Midland Secondary School 16-14, 15-7.

In the Midget division final, the St. Theresa's "A" team -- one of two sets of Midget Crusaders -- were dropped 15-8, 13-15, 15-17 after a tough championship struggle with St. Robert's Secondary School.

Eight teams were entered in each division.

The MSS Seniors finished third in their four-team pool (St. Theresa's won the other) and defeated Woodbridge in the consolation round before being edged 16-14, 16-14 by Banting Secondary School in the consolation championship.

The other two St. Theresa's Junior teams finished first and second in their pool. MSS beat the "C" squad in the final semi-finals, leaving the Crusaders with first, third and fourth-place finishes in the final analysis.

MSS also had a Midget entry, which finished third in pool play and went on to win the consolation championship with a 15-

8, 15-7 victory over Collingwood Collegiate Institute.

St. Theresa's Midget "B" team were MSS' victims in the con-

solation semi-finals.

Ecole Le Caron took part in the Midget section, finishing third in their pool and losing a close 2-15, 15-13, 14-16 to

Collingwood in the consolation semi's.

The St. Theresa's Seniors will get another chance to test their prowess Oct. 2 in the

David and Mary Thomson Tournament in Toronto, an annual early-season gathering of the province's top squads.

Holey smoke!

The number of holes-in-one at Midland Golf and Country Club was tripled on the weekend as a pair of local golfers came up with late-season aces.

Clay Hewer of Wendake Beach holed his drive on the 171-yard, par 3 second hole with a five wood on Friday and Ed Mechan of Midland potted his tee shot on the 177-yard 11th with a four iron on Saturday.

They were the second and third holes-in-one recorded at the club this year. The other was a spring ace by Joe Donaldson.

Mechan's accomplishment was witnessed by Ray Miller and Ord Patterson and Hewer's by playing partner Ike Buck.

Hewer, an MGCC member, said his ace was even more satisfying because there aren't too many more days this year in which the opportunity will arise. It was his first hole-in-one in more than 50 years at the game: "As a matter of fact, it's the first one I even ever saw."

According to calculations by Golf Digest magazine, the odds against a hole-in-one by a "regular" golfer are more than 10,700 to one against.

NOTICE OF INTENTION TO DESIGNATE

Take Notice that the Council of the Corporation of the Township of Tay intends to designate the property including land and building at the following municipal address as property of an architectural and historical value or interest under Part IV of The Ontario Heritage Act, 1974, R.S.O. Chapter 122.

HAZEL STREET

Waubashene Memorial Church—

That the church is an architecturally significant building, of a style and having proportions representative of the period in which it was erected (1881) and for which neither the materials nor the building expertise are readily available today.

That the building has historical significance. Although the first settlement by Michael Labelle was in 1833, there was no church in Waubashene until the present structure was erected from local lumber on the authority of the Honorable W.E. Dodge, an American whose name is perpetuated in the automobile industry. It was part of the contract entered into by the Honorable W.E. Dodge that he would build a town, a church, and a library at Waubashene, for the workers of the Georgian Bay Lumber Company.

Any person may, within thirty (30) days of the first publication of this notice, send by registered mail or deliver to the Clerk of the Township of Tay notice of his or her objection to the proposed designation together with a statement of the reasons for the objection and all relevant facts. If such a Notice of Objection is received, the Council of the Corporation of the Township of Tay shall refer the matter to the Conservation Review Board for a hearing.
