They'll be prepared Newly-elected councillors will learn the 'finer arts'

Newly-elected municipal councillors won't be heading into their jobs unprepared following this November's local elections.

Sponsored by the Association of Municipalities of Ontario and the provincial municipal affairs secretariat, a series of information-packed seminars will begin this winter, providing courses on the finer points of local municipal techniques such as government policy-making, financial control and administration.

Classroom-style meeting rooms equipped with audiovisual and other aids will be set up in community halls, hotels and motels across the province following this November's municipal election.

Seminars will be held in places as

far apart as London and Ottawa, as far north as Kenora, Tunder Bay and Sault Ste Marie.

At the heart of the seminars will be the role and responsibilities of municipal government and information from individual experience in running villages, townships, towns, cities, boroughs and counties in Ontario.

The best available expertise will be brought to bear on this: mayors, commissioners of finance, chairmen of regional municipalities, clerk-treasurers and many more, ensuring that the representatives you elect will be better prepared to govern effectively and efficiently on your behalf for the next three years.

NOTICE OF INTENTION TO DESIGNATE

Take Notice that the Council of the Corporation of the Township of Tay intends to designate the property including land and building at the following municipal address as property of an architectural and historical value or interest under Part IV of The Ontario Heritage Act, 1974, R.S.O. Chapter 122.

HAZEL STREET
Waubushene Memorial Church—
That the church is an architecturally significant building, of a style and having proportions representative of the period in which it was erected (1881) and for which neither the materials nor the building expertise are readily available today.

That the building has historical significance. Although the first settlement by Michael Labelle was in 1833, there was no church in Waubushene until the present structure was erected from local lumber on the authority of the Honorable W.E. Dodge, an American whose name is perpetuated in the automobile industry. It was part of the contract entered into by the Honorable W.E. Dodge that he would build a town, a church, and a library at Waubushene, for the workers of the Georgian Bay Lumber Company.

Any person may, within thirty (30) days of the first publication of this notice, send by registered mail or deliver to the Clerk of the Township of Tay notice of his or her objection to the proposed designation together with a statement of the reasons for the objection and all relevant facts. If such a Notice of Objection is received, the Council of the Corporation of the Township of Tay shall refer the matter to the Conservation Review Board for a hearing.
