# Pressure is off Orser — for now

A lot of pressure has been taken off Canadian senior mens' figure skating champion Brian Orser over the past couple of weeks -- some lifted by national figure skating officials and some by a sports doctor

at Toronto's Wellesley Hospital.

The physician, Dr. Hastings, who treats various members of Canda's athletic community including members of the Toronto Maple Leafs, gave Orser good news about a stress fracture in the skater's lower leg early last week.

The fracture, which bothered Orser in his first International competition two weeks

ago at St. Ivel, England, shouldn't cause any serious problems, said the doctor, but he warned the skater to be careful anyway and keep the leg on ice after every workout.

Orser won the St. Ivel

competition for the second straight year, beating West Germany's Norbert Schramm -- last year's world silver medalist and defending Skate Canada champion.

The second relieving of pressure for the Penetanguishene native will come after this year's Skate Canada competition, scheduled for to begin in two weeks in Kitchener.

Orser said yesterday from his training base in Orillia that Canadian officials have decided to take him off the team which will travel to a freeskating competition in Holland following the Kitchener event because they figured the extra burden would be too much to ask of him before the 1983 world championships.

"They thought it would be just too much," said Orser. "After a big competition like Skate Canada, you tend to go down mentally right afterwards."

So it'll be training and more training after Skate Canada -- through the Canadian championships, where Orser will defend his two-time title in late January in Montreal, and right up to the worlds, which will be held this season in Helsinki in March.

Last year, Orser finished fifth in the worlds; the year before, was seventh. Obviously, both Orser and everyone involved the national program are optimistic that this will be the medal year and such optimism requires concentration.

Orser's foremost Canadian rival of recent campaigns, Brian Pockar, winner of the bronze medal at last year's worlds after finishing second to Orser in the Canadian championships, is out of the picture after turning professinal this year -- a move which allowed Orser the opportunity to perform in Skate Canada.
