Katimavik program working wonders

"Katimavik" is an Inuit word which means meeting place, and 11 young participants have come to a meeting place in Midland.

Katimavik is a ninemonth, governmentsponsored program established for Canadian youth between the ages of 17 to 21.

They come from all parts in Canada (1) to learn an alternative lifestyle; (2) to develop personally; (3) to do volunteer community work and (4) to see and learn about the country.

Within these four philosophies, Katimavik has seven learning objectives. These objectives are under the

supervision of four committees. This is the report of the committees in charge of Environment and Appropriate Technology and Work Skills.

Environment and

Appropriate Technology The purpose of this learning objective is to become aware of the environment and people's effects on it and to study and follow a lifestyle appropriate to the world we live in. Katimavik participants learn to lead a "conserver" instead of a "consumer" lifestyle.

The group has learned about environment, pollution and nonrenewable resources by visiting the Wye Marsh interpretative Center. They learned about local environment and landforms by taking a 30,000 Island Boat Cruise.

They also had an interesting visit to a home which uses passive solar heating in Coldwater.

The committee, along with the Socio-Cultural committee, is planning a trip to the outdoor learning program, Project Dove.

Work Skills The work skills ob-


jective simply is what the name suggests. The committee is responsible for monitoring the participant's development of work skills.

Participants have chosen individual work skill goals. These personal goals range from learning how to do minor repair to learning about different career areas such as Coaching and Geriatrics. Also, many of the participants are learning how to make useful objects for the house such as shelves, towel racks, compost bins and

so forth.

Already within this past month, the group has made two sets of bunk beds with the help of a carpenter, as a resource person.
