
Redskins burn final foe before playoffs begin

The Commodore Redskins slaughtered the Unknowns 56-0 last weekend in their final sacrificial offering of the 1982 Penetanguishene-Midland Touch Football League season before the playoff rites begin this Sunday.

The Redskins wound up their season just as they maintained it throughout-undefeated, and very much on top of things.

The rest of the league also played last Sunday, though, settling the final order in an effort to determine which among them might be lucky enough to buy time before the Redskins lower the championship boom in a couple of weeks.

The Dial-A-Movie Strikers maintained their second-place standing despite a 34-20 loss to the third-place Huronia Optical Crusaders, the Brooklea Eagles settled into fourth

with a 31-0 whipping of Midnite Express, the Cumming-Nicholson Stompers clobbered the Hydro Hawks 32-0, the Guzzlers edged the Raiders 13-12 and the Renegades got by the Broncos 9-0.

This Sunday's semi-finals will match the unfortunate Eagles against the Redskins (Midland Secondary School, 12 noon), the Strikers against the Crusaders (Ecole Secondaire Penetanguishene Secondary School, 12 noon), the fifth-place Guzzlers against the eighth-place Unknowns (MSS, 1:15 p.m.), the sixth-place Stompers against the seventh-place Raiders (ESPSS, 1:15 p.m.), the ninth-place Hawks against the 12thplace Renegades (MSS, 2:30 p.m.), and the 10th-place Broncos against the 11th-place Express (ESPSS, 2:30 p.m.).

Midland stopped short in tourney

The Midland Oldtimers won two games before being stopped by the eventual division champions at last weekend's fourth annual Georgian Bay Oldtimers Hockey Tournament at the Flos-Elmvale Community Centre.

Sixteen teams took part in the event -- four in each of four divisions -- with the Toronto Overland Express Wheelers winning the 'A' division titile.

The 'B' division was won by the Agincourt Antiques (last year's 'A' winners), the 'C' crown was taken home by the Mississauga Rattlers -- who bumped off the Midland contingent -- and the 'D' hardware was earned by the Mississauga Evacuees.

The host Georgian Bay Indians -- a club based in Elmvale but which includes players from all across Huronia -- concentrated on hosting the competition and didn't take part in the on-ice activity.

The Midland squad started off the event with a 3-2 decision over the Innisfil Lamplighters. Edgar Dorion did all the scoring in that one, plotting both regulation-time goals for

Midland and adding the winner in a shootout.

Four other Midlanders shared in the damage to Schomberg in their second outing as Murray Yorke. Tom Garner. George Dunn and Fred Flood all scored to give Midland a 4-1 decision. Bill .Knibbs had both Midland goals in the club's final appearance. It was a close one, with the Rattlers scoring into an empty net to secure a 4-2 win.

The Midland club will be at it again Nov. 14 (11 a.m.) at Midland Arena when they host the Penetanguishene Oldtimers for an exhibition tangle.

After that, the Indians will travel to Stroud for a tournament this weekend and will be at it again in tournament action in Coldwater during the last weekend of the month.

After that, the Indians will be idle until a January get-together in Oakville. The club also has a trip to Florida on tap for early next year.

Last season, the Indians won a gold medal in a California tournament and, in previous years, have collected gold medals in St. Petersburg, Florida, and Copenhagen, Denmark.

Bob Ruston and his Penetanguishene curling rink came away from the Bruce County Open Bonspiel \$1,000 richer last weekend.

The team, composed of skip Ruston, viceskip Gilles Cinq-Mars, second Martin Robillard, and lead Denis Gignac, won five straight games before losing 4-3 to Dave Vellanoff of London in an exciting final clash.

The Ruston rink bumped off last year's Ontario winner and Canadian Brier participant Bruce Munroe (London) and the Ontario runner-up Dave Walker (Toronto) back-to-back to secure a spot in the finals.

With the score 3-3 in the 10th end of that final, Vellanoff (who had last rock advantage) had to hit and stay in the rings to win.

Ruston, who is sponsored by Chalet Sports of Penetanguishene, took the loss in stride though, considering his runners-up showing a big improvement over last year's showing when he lost to Ken Buchan in the quarter-finals.

Ruston's next major cash bonspiel is in Harriston in early December. In the mean time, the team will continue its schedule at the Penetanguishene club every Thursday night.
