The stars of the game do not always divert the attention of the fans. O.W. (Charlie) King, a player with a quick stick around the goal, has caused his share of grief to goalies in the opposition net.

Paul Steele and Rob Connelly continued their relentless pursuit of opponents, particularily in the role of offensive forecheckers. Who can judge the value in a win of the pressure applied by those small players who damage you by making you handle the puck carefully or lose the advantage of control.

Sir Joseph, outraged at Ralph's presumptuous behaviour, has his young rival clapped in irons and all seems lost until Little Buttercup, a mysterious gypsy peddler-woman, reveals a dark secret that removes the social barrier separating Ralph and Josephine.

All is well and the scene ends in general celebration.

Produced and directed by Helga Veall, the operetta involves some 50 students from Grades 5 to 8. Performances will be given for the public on Dec. 8 and 9 at 7:30 p.m. Admission will be \$1.25 (Students 75 cents).


