# Cents blow three-goal lead as Kings storm back in third period

Cents failed to hold a 5-2 lead and had to settle for 5-5 tie against the Kings.

It appeared for a while in the first period that the game would turn into a real high scoring game, as Kings Owen Quilty both of the scored twice in 16 seconds, and then surrendered one to Cents only five seconds later. 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Before the opening frame ended, Paul Hahn got Cents even with his goal at the 10:09 mark. The period ended in a 2-2 tie with Cents holding a 16-12 edge in shorts.


